Last year, another offer was made. It having been objected that it would be unjust to the District, to collect toll at the limits of the city without bearing any part of the expenses of the approaches, this Council offered to keep the road in repair half-way to the next toll-gate. This offer was deemed fair. The Government had now come to the resolution, that they would not repair the roads at all, but leave them to go to destruction at the same time that they received all the tolls paid for repairing them; this he thought most unjust. (Hear, hear.) So that the eitizens must first pay toll for keeping in repair.
