Then I shall put the direct question, Mr. Speaker. I should like to ask the Prime Minister whether medicare is to start on July 1, 1968.

To which the Prime Minister replied:

Mr. Speaker, that is so under the law and the legislation we passed, in which no change has been made.

Mr. Douglas: I have a supplementary question, Mr. Speaker. In view of the fact that the statements the Acting Prime Minister has just quoted were all made prior to this matter being submitted by the Minister of Finance to his cabinet colleagues following the federal-provincial conference of finance ministers last week, may I ask the Acting Prime Minister whether there has been any change in the government's position since these statements were made, and whether we may take it that the government intends to proceed with medicare on July 1, 1968.

Mr. Martin (Essex East): The Prime Minister's statement certainly answers that question.

Mr. A. D. Hales (Wellington South): I have a supplementary question for the Minister of Finance. Would he care to advise the house as to the number of representations he has received asking him to postpone medicare?

Mr. Speaker: Order. I do not think this question is in order.

Mr. Martin (Essex East): That is exactly it would be impossible to make an estimate of the amount of revenue needed. Therefore I do not contemplate making any provision in the statement I shall be making next week.
