# REQUEST FOR STATEMENT OF AVIATION POLICY

Mr. Lloyd R. Crouse (South Shore): Mr. Speaker, I wish to direct a question to the Minister of Transport. In view of the concern that has been expressed by the 224 members of the Air Transport Association of Canada is it the government's intention to announce this session a consistent federal aviation policy, with special reference to a policy governing mainline and regional carriers?

Hon. Paul Hellyer (Minister of Transport): Mr. Speaker, there is a policy in existence which is being implemented at the present time. In respect to regional carriers, as my hon. friend well knows, there was a considerable period when it was not possible to implement the announcements made by my predecessor but these are now in process of being implemented, and I think the situation is improving and is being well received by the industry and the travelling public. There will, of course, be further changes in due course. A number of these are under study by the government, and particularly by the Minister without Portfolio (Mr. Richardson). I do not imagine that there will be any immediate announcement, but within a reathe House of Commons.
