November 10th, 1925. Hon. Mr. Justice Greenshields, Judges' Chambers, The Court House, Montreal. My dear Dean: -It has been intimated to me that there is in circulation amongst the law students of McGill University, and possibly of the University of Montreal, a petition to the Bar Association of the Province suggesting that the latter body drop from their requirements such subjects as Roman Law, Legal History, Public International Law, Constitutional Law, etc. I have heard that your name appears as signatory to this petition. Will you please tell me if this is so? If you have signed I presume it is in your capacity as a Judge and not as Dean of the Faculty of Law of McGill University, though, you will appreciate, it is difficult for you to speak on matters of legal education without reference to the position you hold as head of the Law Faculty. . I should think such a petition would carry much more weight if endorsed by the Law Faculties of the Universities than as a petition from a student-body, whose wisdom in such matters might be questioned.
