The two others were present, it is true, at the first dedication at Grande-Ligne, but more from curiosity than any thing else; for on their return home after the services of the day, they strengthened each other in their religious views, by saying that after all the Roman Catholic religion was the first religion, and consequently the best. But God in his own good time showed them by a never to be forgotten experience where the better religion was found. There was on this day of dedication, "a joy unspeakable and full of glory" in many hearts, at the remembrance of God's dealings towards us.

Three services were held on the same day. At the two first, the house was quite full, making an audience of about three hundred persons. The dedication sermon was preached in the morning by Rev. L. Normandeau from the words of the inscription on the front of the chapel: "Preach the Gospel to all nations." The discourse was very appropriate and very impressive, especially when recalling what the first missionary in this field had to encounter and to suffer, when he began to preach the Gospel to the French Canadian population, which, although nominally Christian, was a stranger to the *Good News* of a free redemption by the sacrifice of Christ.
