NO NAVAL DEMONSTRATION. Proposed Display of Strength Against Turkey Abandoned.

BERLIN, Jan. 15 .- (Can. Press.)-The question of a naval demonstraby the fleets of the European powers against Turkey was shelved, according to official circles here prior to the attempts of the foreign am-basadors in London to formulate a oint note to be delivered to the Turkish Government The reason for its shelving was that several of the great powers, including some of those not pelonging to the Triple Alliance, had declared against such a demonstration. A sharp denial was given today to the assertion which has appeared in the foreign press that the delay which occurred in handling the joint note of the powers to Turkey was due to Germany, which it was alleged alone had pronounced against a collective naval demonstration before Constantinople.


