The harmony of the visible creation was doubtless designed to convince men of the being and unity of God! And the language of the Saviour himself leads us to conclude that the unity of the church, was intended to prove, and to manifest, the new creation. "That they all may be ons; as thou, Father, art in me, and I in thee; that they also may be one in us, that the world may believe that thou hast sent me. And the glory which thou gavest me. I have given them; that they may be one, even as we are one. I in them, and thou in me, that they may be made perfect in one, and that the world may know that thou hast sent me, and hast loved them, as thou hast loved me." Let this mion be realized, -and the glorious spectacle would act with resistless power upon the world! It would take from unbelievers their favorite objections : -It would silence, if not convince, the sceptic ; - and remove the great stumbling-block out of the way of the serious enquirer: while it would give new lustre to the christian character; new energy to the church's efforts, and new prevalency to her prayers.

If our usefulness has been diminished for want of this union, let us now be humbled; and white we seek to make manifest the degree of unity which actually exists,—let us labour to render that unity more compact and more enlarged. I rejoice in the union of the churches of our own denomination in this Province; believing it will be the means of increasing our usefulness, and promoting the cause of simple, scriptural christianity.
