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

Shuster's Successor Stirs Up Friction F. S. Cairns and Other Americans

Notified to Pack Up and TEHERAN, Jan. 12 .- (Can. Press.)-

The treasury crisis has taken an extraordinary turn. Acting under in-structions of the cabinet, M. Mornard, the Belgian ex-director of Persian customs, to-day summarily took posses-sion of the treasury offices, refusing to recognize the status of F. E. Cairns, the American, who was left in charge of treasury by W. Morgan Shuster, the deposed treasurer-general, when latter left Teheran yesterday for the United States. M. Mornard, in acquainting Mr. Cairns and the other American officials of the cabinet's message, told them that if there was further delay in turn-

over the treasury, not only would be dismissed from their positions, punished. This procedure is all the more inexplicable as Mr. Cairns has shown no disposition to retard the work of transferring the office to the commission appointed to take over the duties of the treasury-generalship. It is stated that Mornard asked the Americans whether they were willing to serve under him as treasurer-general and that they declined to do so. The appointment of the Belgian as treasurer-general appears to have removed all hope of preserving the financial Organization created by Mr. Shuster.
