We cannot preserve our reputation as Canadians won at Ypres, at Courcellette, at Vimy Ridge, at Passchendaele, at Amiens, at Valenciennes, without money. These are things that have to be thought of as well as victory, when the Victory Loan is considered. They are part of the victory. They arise out of it, and are intertwined with it.
