

Discussing the reported determination of the typographical union to refuse to create conditions to meet the needs of returned men taking vocational training, officials of several unions stated their emphatic opinion that the members of their organizations would never desert the returned soldier, and that he would be received with real welcome by trades union organizations generally. Tom Craw-

inan to receive what was cohing to him for work done during probation. The \$18 a week from the government, he said. should be considered in the light of a necessary pay to which the returned man was entitled as a means of existence in recompense for his part in the great war. The union would readily accept all vo-cational students who were paid by the manufacturers, and there were hopes that this would become a factor in re-edu-cation of the returned man. "If the vo-cational student earns say \$7 a week at a boot factory during his six months' training under government supervision, that weekly wage of \$7 would aggregate about \$170," said Mr. Brown. "During the next six months he would receive, say, \$15 a week from the firm. Add the \$7 a week saved from the previous six months and he would have a total of \$22 a week. If he continued training for still another six months he would 'er






