Red Letter Day. The eighth day of the campaign was a red letter one from a canvassing standpoint, many more small applications being received than on any day yet. This is considered a hopeful sign by the men in charge of the loan, who have been somewhat worried because of the fact that the average subscriber has been holding back. In any event, most cheery reports were issued from the various headquarters last night, and predictions were general that Toronto's objective of \$30,000,000 would be reached inside of the three weeks allotted for the campaign. The small industries are now setting a splendid pace. Two firms which employ 100 men showed 100 per cent yesterday, and one firm gained eight per cent. Thompson & Sons, lithographers, of 32 Temperance street, subscribed 225 per cent over last year, and 30 per cent of the payroll.

At the university the students are doing well, a canvasser yesterday, less than two hours, securing subscriptions amounting to \$5678, with the school of science leading all other faculties.

Red Triangle Club. The staff of the Red Triangle Club are doing their thing. Every one of the staff of 21 returned men has subscribed to the loan, representing 50 per cent of the annual payroll. An

honor flag will be presented to the club tonight and it will be unique on account of the number of crests which will adorn it.

The club are holding a smoker tonight at their club rooms beginning at 8:30 p.m. Mayor Church, General Gunn and J. M. Godfrey will be present. Mr. Duggan will speak. It is expected that a large crowd will attend.

A remarkable record is credited to the Anglo-Canadian Leather Company which went over the top with a record of 100 per cent of its 48 employees subscribing. In addition they captured 8 crests.

The Litho Print Company is also on the verge of getting into the charmed circle.

The schools are also doing their bit. 27 teachers out of 28 at Earl Grey, Jones avenue, of which Mr. Elliott is the principal, subscribing.

The Queen street asylum attendants purchased bonds to the extent of \$4,000.

At the gathering of workers at the King Edward last night the spirit of the workers was in evidence to their fine success, the collections for the day in Toronto being over \$10,000,000, and the entire total well on to the \$45,000,000 mark.

The gathering was also evidenced by the reading of a very humorous description of the King Edward meeting written by D. J. McDougall, and a baseball match in Italian dialect by Vice-Chairman Doble. The health of the Prince of Wales was added to the Oldfield sang the song of the popular prize. The report of comparisons with figures of the previous evening between thirteen and fourteen million above Toronto, will only serve to increase the fervor of emulation in the workers of the Queen City. Toronto teams are more than a million ahead of last year.

The parade on Sunday promises to be a record one in the number of attractions. Already there are fifteen entries for the industrial section and the horse vehicle section bids fair to surpass that of Ontario-motor. For each of the sections—motor and horse—there are one \$100 and two \$50 prizes. The tanks are proving a great drawing card and are doing their bit splendidly. When read at a meeting of His Majesty's Army and Navy Veterans, held in the Sons of England Hall last night, the by-laws and constitution of the Toronto League of Veterans met with approval by the members, with the exception of two clauses, dealing with the acquisition of old soldiers' homes and the number of representatives to be delegated from each veterans' association to the league.

It was suggested by the meeting that two members from each association be sent as delegates in place of seven, as is the present custom, and that instead of the league acquiring old soldiers' homes, the government should be requested to provide old age pensions for the returned men.

It was also decided to investigate the manner in which the money collected during the big four drive for the proposed erection of club houses for the returned men, had been disposed of, and a committee was appointed to inquire into this matter.
