LYMPHANGITIS.

Agricultural Editor: I should like some advice in regard to my horse, ten years old, that has a bad case of lymphangitis. One hind leg is swollen up and so sore that he cannot put i on the floor or ground. Ans. The attack follows a period of idleness during which the horse is generously fed on rich food. To prevent the disease always cut down the grain ration when a horse has no work to do and see that he has some out-door exercise each day. At time of an attack bandage leg from foot to body with soft straw or hay rope and keep the rope bandage saturated with hot water in winter or cold water in summer and put on more bandage high 'up as weight of water forces first bandage downward. Feed soft bran mashes and in each dissolve a tablespoonful of saltpeter; also dis solve same amount of saltpeter in each pailful of cold water and keep the water in front of horse all of the time. Three or four ten-drop doses of tincture of aconite in water along with two dram doses of saltpeter should be given at intervals of three or four hours at outset of attack. A physic of raw linseed oil is indicated if the horse is fat and costive. A physic ball should only be administered by the qualified veterinarian and after the high fever has subsided.






