BOND'S PROGRAM OF ECONOMY

RADICAL REFORMS PROPOSED BY THE UNION'S MAYOR.

\$3000 a Year to be Saved by Reduction in Salaries.—A Special Audit of the Town Books to be Made, Extending Back for Two Years or More—Changes in the Time of Assessing and Collecting Debts.

The Council Chamber, Toronto Junction, was crowded yesterday morning at the inaugural ceremonies of the new council. The Rev. Mr. Perry opened the proceedings with prayer, after which Mayor Bond, who not only looks very much like the President of the United States, Grover Cleveland, but also possesses that eminent statesman's principle of reform, delivered his inaugural address. GENTLEMEN,—I wish to draw your attention to several matters. The large debt, both special and general, makes imperative that the strictest economy should be enforced in every department, consistent with propriety, efficiency, and I would advise: (1) that the clerk and treasurer's offices be amalgamated with a principal clerk and assistant at \$400; (2) reduce the Solicitor's salary to \$500; (3) disburse with the town engineer for the present; (4) disburse with Mr. E. Ellis as assistant superintendent of waterworks and discontinue the salary of \$1000; (5) reduce the salary of Fire Chief to \$100 and discharge one man; (6) reduce the Superintendent of Waterworks salary to \$50 and discharge one assistant; (7) reduce the police force to two men; (8) rearrange the plumbing, sanitary and license inspection. By adopting this course you can effect a saving of \$3000 a year. I desire to advise that a by-law be introduced to affect the changes here proposed. I also advise the procuring of such legislation as will enable us to have the assessment for 1894 stand for 1895 and to have the assessment made in the latter part, and to collect taxes early in each year, thereby saving interest. I would ask you to at once provide the funds necessary for the work in West-End; also to place the waterworks under the Council's control, as the two departments can be best served by one committee.

The following are the standing committees: Works and Waterworks.—Councillors Laughlin, Trustees, W. E. Reid, Armstrong and Heintzman. Meet second and last Wednesday of each month. Fire, Light, Police and Health.—Councillors Gillespie, chairman; Blandall, vice; Harris, Hull, Bond. Meet Monday previous to council meetings. Executive Committee.—Councillors Armstrong, trustees, Laughlin, Wagner, Gillespie and Blandall. High School Trustees.—Rev. C. E. Thomson, Dr. J. F. Williams. Court of Revision.—Coun. Reid, Armstrong, Wagner, Egan and Laughlin. Board of Health.—Mayor Bond, Couns. Harris, Hull, Reid, Armstrong, Wagner, Blandall, Bond and Heintzman. The council then adjourned until 8 in the evening.

Evening Meeting. Council met at 8 p.m. All members present, except Coun. Harris. The by-law appointing auditors was read a third time and passed. Dr. A. H. Perfect, at 8 1/2, and Mr. Menzies, at 12, were appointed. Applications of David Madill and J. H. Raybould for the position of road commissioner were referred to the Council's committee; for position of sanitary inspector at \$300 per year to Board of Health Committee.

On motion of Councillors Bond and Armstrong, Resolved that the Mayor and Chairman of the Executive be and are hereby empowered to have the expert auditors and assistant extend their work backward over the past two years and forward in the future, and to make such arrangements as may be deemed necessary.

The Town Engineer and Board of Works were empowered to arrange to make a stop or stop the work if such arrangement cannot be made in the West-End road. Ordered to give up the books. On motion of Councillors Bond and Armstrong, Resolved, That all the books now in possession of Peter Ellis, as collector of water rates, be handed over to the Town Treasurer forthwith for the purpose of having the same audited, and that the Town Treasurer collect all water rates until further arrangements are made by this council.—Carried.

The Treasurer was authorized to issue a cheque payable to the town solicitor for \$100 to pay to the clerk of the Legislative Assembly, less on proposed special act.

Knitting Factory Exemption. A motion was passed authorizing the mayor and chairman of the Executive Committee (Griffin) in conjunction to make arrangements to meet with the representative of knitting factory and offer special exemptions, to employ at least 20 hands during 10 months, and 75 per cent. of employees to be residents. Carried.

The Mayor and Chairman of Executive were appointed a committee to meet the County Council to re-arrange the terms of the administration of justice, and that the County Council be notified to appoint a committee not in said notice to meet the committee have power to act. Council adjourned to meet Monday evening, Jan. 22, 7:30.
