The unidentified dead are being taken to the Court House. Gray's Hill and Fairview were both badly damaged and the cyclone passed directly west of the North Texas Female College, barely missing it. E. E. Sayles, a deliveryman, drove down Houston-avenue directly after the cyclone. He stated that he saw at least seven men, women and children lying alongside the avenue dead and many wounded. The devastation in spots where the cyclone was the worst is complete. Trees were stripped of their follage in some places while in others they are uprooted. Houses are in some instances entirely gone and in others only a pile of rubbish marks the place where they stood. Capt. Ely's fine residence was blown to pleces. His wife and two children were at home, but fortunately escaped without serious injury. Not a thing remains to mark the spot where only a few hours of Capt. Burgess. His family was absent from the house at the time.

Mayor Tone of Denison, who was in Sherman during the storm, gives the following account of the cyclone: "I was on the Court House Square about 5 c'clock, and heard a roaring wind coming from the south. The next thins I knew, the air was thick with mud and 'small specks resembling ashes. The cyclone did not strike the Court House or jail but followed un past

These have been rendered more stringent in the case of transit animals. A circular sent to the several ports establishes the following regulations in regard to horses from the United States shipped from Canadian ports for Europe:

"No horses shall be permitted to be placed on board any steamship or other vessel for exportation at any canadian port until they have been inspected by a duly authorized inspector at such port, and certified by him to be free from contagious diseases; such inspection to be made within 24 hours of embarkation."

New regulations also provide other safeguards against the shipment of diseased American horses from Canadian ports. For instance, a certain time is to be allowed to lapse between the arrival and the inspection of the animals, and each horse, duly inspected, is to be marked with the letters "V.R." These precautions seem to render impossible the shipment from this country of any but healthy stock.

Montreal, May 15 .- (Special) -- Of all the grand demonstrations ever witnessed in Montreal, that tendered to Sir Charles Tupper was the greatest. afficent display, and some 7000 people were in line to escore the Prime Minister from the Liberal-Conservative rooms to Sohmer Park, where the meeting was heli It is admitted that fully 20,000 peo-

ple were in and around the building. and with the exception of a dozen or so roughs, who were a little noisy at the beginning of the meeting, the immense crowd was quite an orderly

Senator Villeneuve presided, and on the platform were the Premier, Hon. Messrs. Angers, Taillon, Desjardins, Sir A. P. Caron and over 500 of the leading Conservatives of Montreal, and the Province of Quebec. Although Sir Charles looked in splendid form and his voice was good, there were many thousands who could not

hear him, but this mattered not, they saw the Cumberland war horse, and cheered themselves hoarse in his honor. Sir Charles invited the business men of the metropolis to the Windsor Hall on Saturday evening, where they could listen to him with greater comfort than at this tremendous meeting. He said that although he realized the vastness of Montreal, yet he never believed it possible for such a body of men to be got together at a political assembly. The Prime Minister repeated what he had said at Winnipeg, and amid cheers, defied Hon. Mr. Laurier or any other man to show that he had ever, during the 40 years of his political life, appealed to religious or national prejudices. He declared that this was the prelude of victory, which was sure to come to the Conservative

party on June 23 next.
