That Grain-Buying Case. That Grain-Buying Case.

The council of the Toronto Board of Trade, at a special session to-day. (Friday), resolved to support the grain section of the board in its decision already announced of appealing against Judge Morson's judgment in the grain-buying case of White v. McIntosh, and if the said judgment is found to be good law to ask the Attorney-General to amend the existing statute. It will be remembered that in the case in question the defendant, McIntosh, a Toronto grain dealer, bought of the plaintiff, White, an East York farmer, a load of wheat at a certain figure, after examining a sample from one bag; that afterwards McIntosh refused to pay the full price he had agreed upon on the alleged ground that the whole load was not up to the standard of the sample, and that White, through his solicitor, Sydney Greene, sued and recovered judgment for the full price.

The resolution passed by the Board of Trade council yesterday reads: That, in the opinion of this council, the judgment in White v. McIntosh is one that would work great injury, if taken as a precedent, in buying and selling commodities, and would be an inducement to the practice of deception and fraud on the part of dishonest traders, and that, owing to the importance of the principle involved, the council heartily endorse the efforts of the Grain and Milling Section of the board, and pledges themselves to exert all the influence which they may properly exert looking to the remedying of the vicious state of affairs which would obtain if the decision should be regarded as a precedent.

It is understood, by the way, that the farmers of the county are also moving in the matter, and that they have called a meeting to be held at the Albion Hotel on Saturday, June 18. They will likely suggest the appointment of official inspectors to pass upon the quality of all farmers wheat coming into the Toronto market.

Wheat Crop Acreage.

The most difficult point in crop reporting is always a determination of the comparative acreage one year with another. This year it is especially difficult in the case of wheat, because of the fact that price conditions have stimulated an effort to raise a great crop. Orange Judi Farmer has made its usual careful enquiry through country agents, and a consolidation of these local returns shows that farmers in every section have united in seeding an enormous crop. In the United States winter wheat belt the apparent increase is 7.2 per cent, over last year's harvested area, bringing the total winter wheat nerenge now growing for harvest up to 25,651,000 acres. But for the drought failure in California, where more than 1,000,000 acres which were planted have been abandoned so far as grain is concerned, and are being cut for hay, the breadth this year would approach 27,000,000 acres.






