NO CAUSE WAS DISCOVERED

Why Walter Hulse, the Well-Known
Hotelman at Richmond Hill,

BLEW HIS BRAINS OUT WITH A RIFLE

And Threw a Happy Home Into
Sudden Mourning—An Inquest
Deemed Unnecessary.

Richmond Hill, Feb. 5.—(Special.)—The
usual quiet of the village of Richmond
Hill receiving a rude awakening on Saturday
morning when the old intelligence of the
suicide of Mr. Walter Hulse, the youth-
ful proprietor of the Palmer House, was
conveyed from neighbor to neighbor. The
occurrence had happened between 10 and 11
in the morning, when the deceased was last seen,
and 11-45, when the body was discovered
cold and lifeless in the front cellar of the
hotel. Beside the body was a loaded
rifle, that had been used to accomplish the
rash act. The left hand was badly black-
ened, and appearances would indicate that
the muzzle of the rifle had been held to the
mouth of the victim, while the trigger was
pulled by the right. The bullet had entered
the roof of the mouth and passed out at the
back of the head, causing instant death.
The cellar is situated immediately below
the dining-room, and was not accessible
to anyone except the proprietor. The
bullet entered the head at the base of the
skull, and the body was found in a pool
of blood. The inquest was held at 11-45
and the jury returned a verdict of suicide.
The coroner, Mr. Hulse, was not present.
The body was taken to the morgue and
