Don't Want an Abattoir.

F. Hunnisett headed a deputation which protested against the establishment of a big abattoir. He ridiculed the largely signed petition which was presented to Council by Ald. Graham, and said it was dead easy to get signatures. In strengthening his statement he said that 40 years ago a Mayor of Toronto had signed a petition which in effect was that a scaffold be erected in St. Lawrence market, and that the Mayor be hanged upon it.

But Red Tape Keeps Her in the Jail-Heathen State of Af-

Ald. Noble emphasized to the Civic ommittee yesterday his protest regarding the inhuman way in which Poronto, and he drew a sad picture of the condition of the 40 unfortunates who are confined in the jail because they have lost their senses. He referred again to the case of the young woman who was a raving maniac in charge of her three young children, the youngest two months old. Another unfortunate had to give up her cot and take a shake down in a corner to make room for the newcomer. "She was simply sent to a place where she could beat out her brains against bare walls or jail bars, while she should have been sent to some haven where she would rest."

Revenue Cutter Has a Thrilling Ex-

S. Feb. 12.-The revenue cutter Sem nole, from Boston, Mass., has arrived safely at Port Basque after a terrific battle lasting eighteen hours with heavy

Arctic ice. The Semihole is now one hundred miles from the imprisoned fishermen in the Bay of Islands.

Between this point and where a dozen or more schooners are held fast in the frozen sea still heavier ice must be encountered before the Seminole can succeed in reaching her destination. Exhausted after their struggle against the vast ice fields, the daring crew of

the Seminole is resting for a day pre-paratory to the final dash for the ice imprisoned fleet. The Canadians, who, for more than a month have endeavored in vain to pene-trate the ice field, have given up hope of reaching their countrymen in the Bay of Isles. They think it impossible for the Seminole to force her way thru the pack ice, but the Americans will make the effort to-morrow after coal and more provisions are added to the

revenue cutter's stores.

No word has been heard from the fishermen since one of the fleet which escaped the ice, stopped at this port and reported the plight of the others. It is believed the men on the ill-fated ships are in danger of starvation and grave fears are entertained that many have succumbed to the cold.
