"Trip" Continues to Draw No Falling in Attendance

Another Monster Crowd at the Armories Last Evening --Drill of Collegiate Girls, Concert By Twenty-Sixth Band, and Jap Concert in Gun Room.

"The Trip Around the World" drew another tremendous crowd last night, but those in charge of the doors claimed that the attendance was not as large as that of the previous evening. Others, again, were of the opinion that it was greater than on Thursday. Nevertheless, there were enough people in the Armories to crowd almost every foot of floor space, and money was spent like water in the booths.

Twenty-five cents admission was again charged, but it appeared to have but little, if any, deterrent effect upon the people.

There were quite a number who came to the ticket office with ten cents ready for a ticket, and were somewhat angry when they found they would have to pay a quarter. But invariably, they produced the extra change, and bought a ticket, for the sounds of music and mirth inside proved too great a temptation to resist.

A Great Programme.

The trip was again opened with the grand march in which all persons attached to the different booths took part.

Later the young ladies of the Collegiate Institute gave an exhibition drill, and to say that they scored a triumph is to put it very mildly. Such drilling on the part of any military organization of London would put it far in advance of anything ever seen in this city. In perfect time, and in machine-like squads, the girls carried out the orders of their drill instructor, Lieutenant Gregory, while the immense crowd looked on in approving wonder.

The girls in the booths, the peddlers of different articles, and the speakers appear to never grow tired. The more money they secure for the monument, the more they seek to secure.

If there was money to be had anywhere, they were sure to get it, and they always gave, the cause considered, good value for the money.

Japan to the Front.

In front of the Japanese booth, Ald. Gilman was stationed with a megaphone, and the ability as a coacher which he has frequently exhibited at baseball games, was brought into great prominence last night. It was impossible to ignore this booth, because in all parts of the armories the voice of the alderman could be heard proclaiming the virtues of the goods of Japan.

Many of the other booths had speakers in front also, with the result that the midway at the Western Fair on a busy day was as quiet as a quaker meeting in comparison.

The Fan Drill.

The fan drill, under the direction of Prof. O'Donnell, of the London Conservatory of Music continues to attract widespread attention. The score of young ladies have been drilled with much care, and in their pretty Japanese costumes, they give an exhibition which is very pleasing.

The band of the Twenty-Sixth Regiment last night provided a splendid programme of music. The selections were rendered, under the direction of Bandmaster Pococke, in a brilliant manner, and many were the compliments paid the musicians by those in the audience.

Japanese Concert.

Solos were rendered to the different band numbers by Messrs. Ernest Beech and H. St. George, and they were greatly appreciated.

The Japanese concert given in the gun shed by a number of the ladies from the Japanese booth, attracted a large audience.

A choice programme had been prepared by Mrs. A. D. Jordan, and it was carried out in an artistic manner. Mrs. Jordan comes in for much praise as the result of the great success of the concert, which assuredly was an artistic treat, and at the same time a money-maker for the monument fund.

Illinois and Indiana Swept by a Tornado

Several Towns and Villages Almost Destroyed—Fatal Cloudburst.

Duquoin, Ills., June 8.—The tornado which struck this vicinity last night caused much damage to residence property and crops, is reported to have swept over Marshall, Ills., doing much damage. Henry Rook and Mrs. Pickston, living near Marshall, are reported killed. There was also much damage near Richview, Ills.

At Carlyle, Ills., hail stones weighing ten ounces and measuring eleven inches in circumference are reported to have fallen.

Terrible Cloudburst.

Louisville, Ky., June 8.—A telephone message from Greensburg reports a cloudburst at Gradyville, Ky., early today, in which ten or fifteen persons lost their lives. Five bodies have already been recovered. Eight houses are reported to have been washed away.

York Destroyed.

Terre Haute, June 8.—The village of York, Ill., was destroyed by a tornado last night. Several persons were killed, and scores injured. Twenty-five or thirty houses were destroyed. Details are meager owing to wires being down.

St. Louis, June 8.—A telegram from Nashville, Ill., says a tornado struck New Minden, Ill., early today, killing four persons and injuring a score of others. New Minden is 25 miles south-east of St. Louis, on the Louisville and Nashville railroad.

KIDNAPPED A SISTER

Teacher in a Catholic School Carried Off in Mysterious Manner.

Duluth, Minn., June 8.—Sister Borromea, a teacher at St. Clement's Catholic School, was kidnapped yesterday by two men, who thrust her into a closed carriage and escaped pursuit.

Sister Borromea was sitting at her desk, when two men entered hurriedly. As they approached her the sister bowed courteously and called one of the men "father."

They immediately seized the teacher and carried her out of the room, and forced her into a waiting carriage. The sister screamed and fought desperately, but she was unable to free herself. The police are unable to find an explanation of the abduction.

AN ESSEX MERCHANT DEAD.

Amherstburg, Ont., June 8.—S. J. Johnson, one of the best known merchants of Essex County, is dead of heart disease. He was 50 years of age. Mr. Johnson was born in Windsor, but came to Amherstburg while still a young man and engaged in business, in which he had been very successful.

LEAPS FROM BRIDGE TO INSTANT DEATH

Dramatic Suicide of an Unknown Woman at Toronto.

Toronto, June 8.—About 7 o'clock this morning an unknown woman threw herself over the second Rosedale bridge and was instantly killed. She had been seen acting in a strange manner for some time on the bridge, and a man asked her what she was doing there, and got for a reply that she was waiting for her brother. She was acting in a nervous manner, and when he turned his back she climbed over the railing and plunged below. He heard shouts from people passing and turning around saw her going. Running to the rail he grabbed her hands and held on, but before help could arrive she had wiggled loose. Another man tried to save her, but her body brushed past his hands as he had them stretched out to grab her. When picked up she had both arms broken and two terrible gashes in her head. This is one of the highest bridges in Rosedale, and she chose the very center at the highest point from which to hurl herself to death.

1,000 MACHINISTS OUT AT TORONTO

The Men Are Demanding a Nine Hour Day With Ten Hour Wages.

Toronto, June 8.—Union machinists, to the number of close upon 1,000, went out on strike this morning, in accordance with a decision reached on Thursday night. All of the big shops in this city and Toronto Junction are affected. The men are demanding a nine-hour day with ten hours' pay, and some conditions regarding the employment of apprentices.

The men assembled in mass meeting this afternoon to discuss the situation.

GAY DAY IN HUNGARY

Nation Celebrating Fortieth Anniversary of Emperor's Coronation.

Budapest, June 8.—Emperor Francis Joseph, in celebration of the 40th anniversary of his coronation as king of Hungary, today decreed far-reaching amnesty, especially for persons sentenced for lese majeste.

The city is gaily decorated and the day is being observed as a general holiday. During the morning the royal family attended a religious service at the cathedral.

AGE SAVED LOGAN FROM PRISON TERM

West Missouri Youth Admits Serious Offense—Released on Suspended Sentence.

Stanley Logan, the 15-year-old boy charged with the seduction of Hazel Irene Thompson, a 14-year-old girl, pleaded guilty this morning when brought before Judge Elliott, and was allowed, on account of his age, to go on suspended sentence.

Mayor Judd appeared on behalf of the boy, and asked for suspended sentence. There was no reformatory or school to which a youth like Logan could be sent, and it would be criminal, he said, to place him in a jail among hardened criminals.

Judge Elliott said he felt that he might be strongly criticised for allowing the boy to go on suspended sentence, but he believed he should not be severe with him, owing to his youth.

"The extreme penalty for the crime with which you are charged," said his honor, to Logan, "is life, with lashes, and had you been older you would surely have received a long term in prison. I sincerely trust that you, who have ruined this child of a girl, will, when you arrive at manhood's estate, look after and provide for her as you should."

Logan lives in West Nissouri, and the girl resides with an aunt in East Nissouri. The boy and his parents visited the girl's home one Sunday last July, and it was on the occasion of this visit that the offense was committed.

WIFE SUES HUSBAND IN COUNTY COURT

Wants Damages For Alleged Illegal Conversion of Household Goods.

One additional case has been entered for the June sessions, which opens in this city on Tuesday next before Judge Edward Elliott.

It is Harris vs. Harris, an action against her husband, Benjamin Harris, to recover \$200 damages for an alleged illegal conversion to his own use of household goods belonging to her. Mrs. Harris alleges that her husband unlawfully took possession of some bedding, candlesticks, parlor suite, carpets, dining-room furniture, two bedrooms, suits, kitchen furniture and dishes, dishes, clothes, linen and pictures.

WRITTEN CREED BARRED

Hamilton, June 8.—At the Congregational Church Union session this morning the discussion on the question of church union was continued. Some of the delegates thought that the union should make it clear that the Congregational Church would not go in for church union unless the written creed was eliminated. On the suggestion of Rev. John Eames, the visiting delegate from England, it was decided not to throw down the gauntlet to the other churches in that way, and no action was taken.

The appointing of committees was the only other business transacted this morning.

The delegates will spend this afternoon sight-seeing, and the business session will be resumed on Monday.

Protest Sent to Ottawa Against Liquor in Camp

Secretary of Temperance League Takes Action, Following Visit to Grounds.

The sale of liquor at the camp on Carling's Heights has resulted in a protest to the militia department at Ottawa by Mr. D. A. McDermid, secretary of the London Temperance League.

Mr. McDermid paid a visit to the camp grounds on Thursday evening, and in consequence of what he claims to have witnessed he has written Sir Frederick Borden, minister of militia, asking that the regulations respecting the sale of liquor in camps be enforced.

Mr. McDermid says that he visited all of the cantons in the camp, and saw liquor being sold in each of them. He did not go to Col. Peters, the district officer commanding, or any of the other officers, but decided to communicate with the authorities at Ottawa. In his letter he says that there are several cantons on the grounds doing business as usual, and that the conditions are the same as last year. "Mr. McDermid also states that it is remarkable that the regulations of the department should be violated and the authority of the Government defied."

The Regulations.

Section 10 of the militia regulations is what Mr. McDermid asks to be enforced. It relates to cantons, and reads as follows:

"Nothing in the King's regulations and orders for the army, so far as they relate to the establishment of

canteens, is to be understood as permitting the sale within the limits of camp grounds, during the annual training of the militia of Canada, of spirits, liquors of any kind; their sale within liquors of any kind; their sale within camps of instruction—officers commanding units of active militia, will, in these districts where the law so directs, be liable to prosecution, in respect of any liquor sold in tents or any other premises subject to their control, in addition to such other penalty as may be inflicted for a breach of military discipline."

No Liquor in Twenty-eight Lines.

The officers of the Twenty-eighth (Perth) Regiment decided some time ago to have no canteen connected with the corps this year, and Mr. McDermid found that the Twenty-eighth was the only regiment which did not have a place for the sale of liquor. He had a conversation with a member of the regiment, and was told that the action of the officers had resulted in the weeding out of a number of undesirable men and a vast improvement in the regiment as a whole. The company in the Twenty-eighth is said to be composed entirely of total abstainers.

During the camp of 1906 the secretary of the Temperance League visited the camp in company with the executive board of the league, and found that liquor was being sold, and that a court of inquiry was instituted, the result being that charges were made and sustained.

M'GREGOR WELL UNFIT FOR USE; RESULT OF ANALYSES MADE KNOWN

M. H. O., However, Thinks That the Pollution Can Be Overcome.

Dr. Hutchinson, medical health officer of London, has received from the provincial health department the results of the analyses of samples of water from the McGregor well, sent to Toronto on the 4th and 5th of June. Very unfortunately the results are not satisfactory.

The samples were found colon bacilli of intestinal origin. A certain amount of chemical pollution was also discernible.

The water taken from the well on Carling's farm is pronounced to be fit for domestic purposes, and will be pumped into the city mains as soon as possible.

Dr. Hutchinson is still of the opinion that the McGregor well water will be found all right. He thinks the pollution can be overcome, and that the city will yet be able to use the water.

Chairman Darch stated that another attempt will be made to clean out the well and to have a sample sent to Toronto which will be found to be pure.

"Of course," he said, "if we cannot do any better than at present we will simply have to abandon the well."

DESTROYED BY 'QUAKE.

Constantinople, June 8.—The village of Serai, 50 miles east of Van, on the Turco-Persian frontier, was destroyed by an earthquake yesterday. Slight shocks were felt at Van.

GEN. BOOTH BACK.

Seattle, Wash., June 8.—The steamship Minnesota arrived here yesterday from the Orient with over 350 passengers aboard. General William Booth of the Salvation Army made the round trip on the vessel.

HAYWOOD COUNSEL SEE COUNTER PLOT

Did Orchard Endeavor to Wreck the Federation

MURDERER STICKS TO STORY

Constantly Corrects Lawyer Richardson in Severe Cross-Examination.

Boise, Idaho, June 8.—Before the court opened yesterday Orchard had been questioned by the attorney for the defense concerning his life narrative down to the early part of the year 1904, when the witness had gone from Denver to Ouzay, Col., with C. H. Moyer, then, as now, president of the Western Federation of Miners. Moyer had been afraid of attack from the "thugs" of the mine owners, and had taken Orchard along as a bodyguard.

The Haywood family group, who number seven, were in court as usual when today's proceedings began.

Orchard was brought in by a squad of deputies and detectives.

Orchard said today that he had not become acquainted with Pettibone until 1904, the early part of the year. He had roomed over Pettibone's store for a while.

"Wasn't it because of that fact that you met him?"

"No; I met him at headquarters," he witness replied.

In Richardson's next went into the attempts made upon the life of Governor Peabody.

He wanted to know why Orchard had gone to Cripple Creek to get Steve Adams to help him assassinate the governor.

"Was it because he was a federation man?" he asked.

"No," replied Orchard, "it was because I wanted a partner."

"Did you know Adams very well?"

"No."

Counter-Plot Say Defense.

Orchard constantly corrected Richardson as to inferences he would draw from his answers, and as to the attorney's recollections of his direct testimony.

Haywood was repeatedly in conversation with Mr. Richardson, suggesting questions, and giving dates. The tack taken by the defense in asking Orchard if he wanted Adams to help him in the assassination of Governor Peabody, because Adams was a federation man, is taken as another indication that the defense will contend that Orchard was in the employ of the Mine Owners' Association, and that he tried to involve the federation, or a federation man in all his crimes. It is certain the defense will claim there was a counter-plot on the part of the mine owners to break up the miners' union by having lawless acts attributed to it.

Richardson went over Orchard's testimony on direct examination, almost word for word with the witness, each question in direct evidence suggesting from five to twenty interrogations in the cross-examination. Orchard adhered to every one of his first statements, and claimed that Mr. Richardson devoted much time to fixing places and dates in the witness's memory, evidently laying the foundation for contradictory evidence when the defense has its inning.

Gambled on the Side.

"Outside of your assassinations," Mr. Richardson asked, "did you have any little enterprises on the side?"
