

HOW A DUCHESS TRAVELS

Police Reveal Secret In Naive Privately Circulated Note.

Vienna, Sept. 5.—If the public desires to know what a duchess takes with her for her personal use while traveling all they have to do is to peruse the following list issued privately to the police by one of the local railway companies. This says: "On the 13th inst., the Duchess of Braganza, while about to travel, lost at the Vienna railway station a small green handbag of which the following were the contents: A wallet containing bank notes, a purse of money, a silver cigarette case (full), a calendar, a gold cardcase, a note book, a leather-covered diary with gold lock, a small violet covered case marked 'letters', a silver liquor flask containing cognac and curacao, a handkerchief, a box of matches, a gold-handled penknife, a gold pencil case, a gold mounted toilet case containing mirror, powder puff, pocket comb, etc., a pack of ivory-backed playing cards. FRENCH DUCKS ELUSIVE

Paris, Sept. 5.—An American who is traveling in Europe with his three daughters and their governess had an amusing experience at a noted cafe on the Boulevard Haussman the other day. The party entered at the dinner hour and the father scanned the bill of fare trying to make up his mind what to order. He heard a neighboring waiter shout "Quatre canard" (four ducks) and decided that was good enough, so also ordered four ducks. His waiter protested that ducks were not on that day's menu, but just then another waiter shouted "two ducks for No. 6." The American got indignant. He thought some special favors were being handed out to regular customers. The proprietor was sent for and the American made his howl. WILL GIVE UP STENSLAND

Morocco Agrees to Turn Him Over to United States Authorities.

Washington, Sept. 5.—The Moorish authorities will interpose no objection to the removal to America of Paul O. Stensland, president of the Milwaukee Avenue State Bank, of Chicago. A dispatch to this effect has been received at the State Department from Minister Gummere at Tangier, dated today. The dispatch added that Stensland is a prisoner in the American legation there. As to the means of returning Stensland to the United States the state and navy officials were in consultation today. There are no American warships in the Mediterranean, or European waters, so the State Department officials are inclined to think that a merchant ship, after all, might serve.

Their plan is to have one of the regular Mediterranean liners cross over from Gibraltar and take Stensland on board there, not stopping afterward at any European port, and thus avoiding any embarrassing issue with foreign officials as to extradition.

LAME AND HALT RUSH TO LOURDES

Many Hundreds of Helpless on the "White Train."

SEVENTEEN TRAINS TO SHRINE

Rises Suddenly from Couch and Kisses Host—Many Pathetic Scenes at Pilgrimage.

Paris, Sept. 5.—When the "White Train" was ready to start from this city for Lourdes the Orleans terminus presented a remarkable spectacle of animation, wherein sickness and pain held equal place with faith and hope.

All the pilgrims were full of expectation that prayed and faith in the curative properties of the miraculous spring would effect a result which physicians despair of attaining. The numbers of the cripples, the paralyzed, the consumptives and the otherwise ailing were swelled by thousands of their relatives and friends, who went to pray with them and to care for them. Among them, with their faces lighted up by religious fervor, were hundreds of priests and Sisters of Mercy, who hurried hither and thither in the crowded station, uttering words of comfort and helping to place the invalids in the trains.

No fewer than seventeen trains, filled to their utmost capacity, left Paris in one day, eight of them with pilgrims who had already journeyed from the north of France, and nine conveying Parisians. Altogether the number of departures from here was about 8,000, and these were added to at wayside stations during the long journey. With the other pilgrimages from east, west and south, the total number booked for Lourdes was estimated at something near 40,000, which figure does not include the tourists going there out of curiosity. The greatest interest about the departure centered round the "White Train," which carried 400 of the most desperate cases, most of them unable to rise from a recumbent position.

Each compartment carried a Sister of Charity, who during the journey never even attempted to snatch a few moments' repose, but was continually engaged in attending the patients or praying or singing hymns.

The station itself was one gigantic hospital, with the corners of the city rubber-tired ambulances, with loud-sounding bells and the white flag with its Geneva cross floating from the whip stand, arrived in quick succession. All around in the outer yard, in the waiting rooms, on the platforms, everywhere, the sick folk lay upon their stretchers waiting to be carried to the train.

The train itself was formed of the very oldest carriages in possession of the company. With few exceptions they were all third-class compartments. On the Father of the Assumption with the pilgrimage to be considered as a penance, and each added discomfort is thought to aid its efficacy. Every sick person who was to travel by the White Train wore a large card fastened with a box of white ribbon. On the card were written the name, the sickness and the number of the carriage of the patient, but there were many of the sick who did not need a card to tell the onlooker what was the matter with them.

There were men, women and children with that raw flush and constant perspiration which mark the consumptive. Every now and then a fearful cough would rack one or another of them, and the handkerchief was stained with red when taken from their lips.

There were cripples of both sexes, so terribly twisted that it was difficult to get them through the carriage door. There were lepers, and women, men and one small boy with lupus.

When the pilgrims had all arrived at Lourdes they prayed and sang in unison. The scene was impressive beyond description.

A number of miracles have been reported, among them being the case of a girl of eighteen who had suffered from disease of the heart. She had lain sleepless and motionless for 48 hours, and twice the watchers had believed her to be dead.

But at the passing of the Host she sat up suddenly on her stretcher and jumped to the floor. She rushed with bare feet across the gravel, caught hold of the Host and kissed it. The scenes of excitement, of supplication and of disappointment around the gromo went on for hours.

At night the vast procession of the pilgrims in and out along the hillside, carrying torches and singing hymns, was very largely attended, among those present being many of the most prominent members of the Provincial Government and several members of the Federal Government.

The pall-bearers were: Hon. Senator Chouette, Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux, R. Poudreau (private secretary to Sir Wilfrid Laurier), L. P. Croteau, J. Meibohm, J. E. Perrault and L. P. Cote.

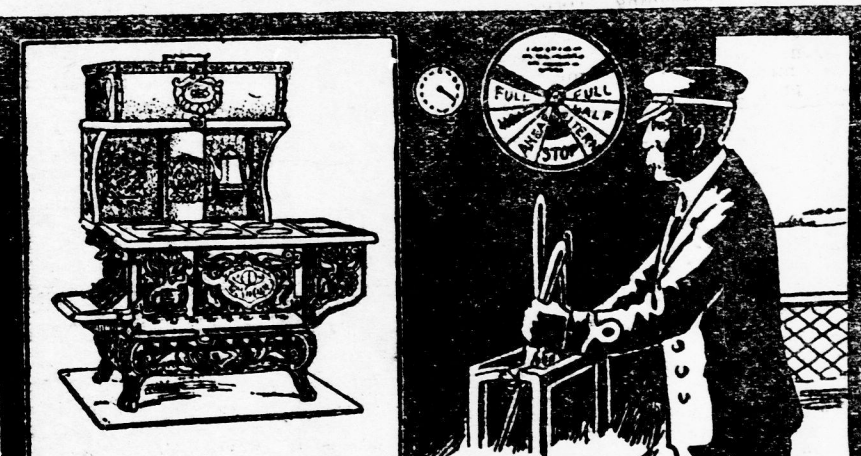
