## FAST TRAINS ARE RUSHING **WAR SUPPLIES** TO STEAMERS

Food and Munitions Hurrying From Middle West,

AT ALLIES' URGENT CALL

Twenty-Five Ships To Be Loaded at One Time at New York.

New York, Jan. 31.—Fast freight trains, loaded with food and other supplies for the Entente Allies, started from the middle west for New York and other Atlantic seato and outer Anantic sea-toard points today under orders, issued as a war measure, by A. H. Smith, regional director of railroads. This action was taken, it is said, upon urgent representations by the British, French and Italian governments as to the food situation The new system provides for the

loading of a large number of ships at ratiroad piers in New York har-bor as soon as the trains arrive. According to Mr. Smith, valuable time will be saved under the plan. The solid trains will run on a 60-hour schedule between St. Louis and Chicago and New York. Under the pre-vious arrangement it took from eight days to two weeks to get such creight here from the middle west.
