ALLIES DROP TONS OF BOMBS.

London, Sept. 5.—The official statement on aerial operations issued tonight says: "Much reconnaissance and photographic work was accomplished by the air force on September 4, and a large number of artillery and contact patrols were carried out. The weight of the bombs dropped by us during the day was twenty-three tons. No bombing was possible after dark.


