TURKEY SURRENDERS

Accepts Terms Unconditionally

ARMISTICE IS EFFECTIVE TODAY

DEFEATED ON ALL SIDES, AUSTRIA IS TO WITHDRAW FROM ITALY AND SERBIA

Evacuation of Allied Occupied Territories, Enemy Claims Is Made In the Interests of Peace—Italians, French, British and Americans Announce Successes.

Vienna, Wednesday, Oct. 30, via London.—Austrian troops fighting on Italian soil will be withdrawn, according to an official statement issued by the war office tonight. The text of the statement reads:

"Taking into account the resolve so often expressed to bring about a conclusion of an armistice and peace, putting an end to the struggle of nations, our troops fighting on Italian soil will evacuate occupied regions."

"In the Italian theatre there has been only minor fighting activity on the Tyrolean front. Between the Brenta and the Piave Rivers fresh and superior enemy forces attacked Mont Asolone and Monte Pertica. Our troops, with unexampled and soldierly faithfulness, brought all the enemy's efforts to naught."

ORDERZO OCCUPIED BY ITALIANS, BRITISH REACH LIVENZA RIVER

London, Oct. 31.—British forces fighting east of the Piave have reached the Livenza River at Francenigo, and the Italians have occupied Oderzo, according to an official statement on the operations in Italy, received by the war office today. The text of the statement reads:

"The advance of the tenth army continued without check throughout the day. British cavalry detachments, in close touch with the Italian cavalry, have reached the western outskirts of Sacile. Troops of the 14th British Corps have reached the Livenza River at Francenigo."

British troops have entered Asiago, according to another report from the British war office covering the operations early Wednesday. The statement also reports continued progress by the third, tenth and twelfth armies along the Piave.

"The advance continued this morning. The tenth army has reached a line two miles east of Ormelle, the western edge of Lutrano, Albiana, Codogno and Vendeniano, and is continuing the advance. It yesterday's operations the Tenth army captured more than 200 prisoners."

"The third army has crossed the Piave south of the tenth army. The advance of the eighth and twelfth armies is proceeding rapidly. Vittorio has been occupied by the eighth army."

"Aviators report that the airfields at Tausue and Fordero and the ammunition dumps at Sacile are burning. A mass of hostile infantry estimated at 10,000 was attacked from the air this morning in the neighborhood of Sacile, and scattered."

"British troops commanded by the Italian general, Pennilla, have entered Asiago."

THOUSANDS OF PRISONERS AND MANY GUNS TAKEN BY ALLIES

Rome, Wednesday, Oct. 30.—Oderzo has been reached by allied troops advancing east of the Piave River, and Serravalle has been taken, according to the official statement issued at the war office tonight. The text of the statement reads:

"Our armies are continuing to rapidly advance after the retreating enemy, who has attempted in vain to retard them. Heads of our columns have reached Serravalle, Orsago and Oderzo."

"Cavalry divisions are advancing in the plains, and some squadrons today entered Sacile."

"In overcoming strong resistance between the Piave and the Montebello, the third army has fought brilliantly. The river crossing at Pont di Piave was carried in a fierce action. The enemy was obliged to evacuate Asiago, which we promptly occupied."

"During the rush of the advance it has been impossible to keep count of the thousands of prisoners and many guns. Besides

CZECHO-SLOVAKS CUT LINE BETWEEN VIENNA AND BERLIN

German Trains Can Go Only as Far as Schnadau.

Paris, Oct. 31.—Communication between Vienna and Berlin, and Budapest and Vienna has been totally interrupted. The Czecho-Slovaks have cut the rail-road between Berlin and Vienna, near Bodenbach, and German trains can go only as far as Schnadau, according to a Zurich dispatch to the Journal.

Asks the Pope to Request Allies Not To Destroy Germany

Cardinal Hartmann Instrumental in Having Appeal Made.

Zurich, Oct. 31.—At an Episcopal conference held at Fuld, Hesse-Nassau, at the instance of Cardinal Hartmann, archbishop of Cologne, an appeal was sent to Pope Benedict asking him to intervene with the Entente nations and persuade them to renounce their determination to destroy Germany, according to the Volks Zeitung of Cologne.

Ontario Has Taken the Sum of \$45,614,800.

MANY ARE DOUBLING UP

Alberta Decides to Purchase Victory Bonds From Sinking Fund.

Toronto, Oct. 31.—Up till 11 o'clock this morning the total subscriptions to the Victory Loan as reported to the Dominion committee from all Canada, was \$69,775,900. No new figures were available at noon in the case of the province of Ontario, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island, or the city of Toronto, which reports separately from the province of Ontario. Reports from other provinces and the city of Montreal—which also has separate returns—were as follows:

British Columbia, \$4,369,050; Alberta, \$1,929,150; Saskatchewan, \$1,250,000; Manitoba, \$2,506,800; Montreal, \$6,581,150; Quebec, \$4,284,750; Nova Scotia, \$2,132,400.

Reports received from the chairman of the provincial committee indicate that the loan is being taken up by an ever-increasing number of industrial workers. This is the significant feature in Winnipeg, where 50 houses already have an honor roll and have won the emblem for 100 per cent efficiency. In Alberta the Provincial Government has decided to purchase bonds from the sinking fund. From Halifax comes word that the Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Company employees have won their honor flag, and Lieutenant-Governor Grant is on a campaign addressing the industrial workers at New Glasgow.

ARE DOUBLING UP

Toronto, Oct. 30.—Dominion headquarters of the Victory Loan announce "Double Up" as the slogan today has given to the drive that must carry the loan over the top. For the first two days of the campaign reports from the province of Ontario brought applications of \$34,000,000, as compared with \$17,000,000 for the first two days last year. So far Ontario is doubling up.

RETREAT OF 15 AUSTRIAN DIVISIONS IS CUT OFF BY CAPTURE OF VADAL PASS

Allied Forces in Italy Are Pressing Advantage to the Utmost—Enemy Losses Are Appalling.

Washington, Oct. 31.—Fifteen Austrian divisions operating between the Brenta and the Piave on the Italian front have had their retreat cut off through the capture of the mountain pass of Vadal by Italian and Allied troops. Official wireless dispatches from Rome today say the advantage is being pressed to the utmost and that a crisis is near. Enemy losses are described as appalling.

ANDRASSY'S NOTE IS DELIVERED AT WASHINGTON

Secretary of State Lansing Receives Note From the Swedish Minister.

Washington, Oct. 31.—Minister Ekengrin of Sweden delivered to Secretary of State Lansing today the note of Count Andrassy, the new Austro-Hungarian foreign minister, asking the secretary to intervene with President Wilson for favorable action on the Austrian request for American and Allied armistice terms.

WILL MAKE GERMAN STATESMEN EXPLAIN WHY THEY FAILED

Inter-Party of Reichstag Wants To Have Reasons For Peace Failure In 1917.

Amsterdam, Oct. 31.—The inter-party committee of the Reichstag, the Lokale Anzeiger of Berlin says it understands, is debating the question of calling to account the statesmen responsible for the failure of the German peace movements late in 1918 and at the beginning of 1917.

14 DIE AT EDMONTON

Edmonton, Oct. 31.—Fourteen deaths from influenza were reported in the Edmonton district yesterday, making a total of 58. There is no abatement in the number of new cases.

EGYPTIAN HEIR APPARENT DIES OF INFLUENZA

Barcelona, Oct. 31.—Announcement is made here that Ezra Bin Abbas, heir-apparent to Ahmed Fud Pasha, Khedive of Egypt, died of influenza on Monday.

INDIVIDUAL PURCHASES TOTAL \$1,652,000

Montreal, Oct. 31.—Individual subscriptions to the Victory Loan yesterday totaled \$1,652,000. Of these, the largest amount was that of Lorne C. Webster, \$500,000. Others were Standard Life Assurance Company, \$250,000; Hopkins & Co., \$200,000; James Alexander, \$100,000; and Canadian Rolling Mills, Canadian Tube and Iron, \$75,000 each. Several subscriptions of \$50,000 each were also received.

KING ALFONSO HAS RECOVERED FROM 'FLU'

Madrid, Oct. 31.—It is announced here that King Alfonso, who has been suffering from an attack of influenza, has been restored to health.

WANTS TO RESIGN

Sir Percy Sherwood Asks To Be Relieved of His Duties.

Ottawa, Oct. 31.—Sir Percy Sherwood has asked to be relieved of his duties as commissioner of the Dominion police, a position which he has held since 1915. His desire to resign is due to ill-health, superinduced by insomnia, from which he has suffered for some time past. Prior to becoming commissioner of Canada's secret service Sir Percy was superintendent. His work since the war commenced has been particularly onerous and his duties have been continually added to as the war has progressed. He was knighted three years ago during the regime of the Duke of Connaught as governor-general.

JOINT APPEAL MADE BY TAFT AND ROOSEVELT

Former U. S. Presidents Ask Election of Republican Majority in Congress.

OUTLINE THEIR REASONS

Criticise Wilson Because He Has Failed To Demand Unconditional Surrender.

New York, Oct. 31.—Theodore Roosevelt and William H. Taft issued here today a joint appeal for the election of a Republican majority in Congress. The statement was said to be the first ever composed and signed by two former presidents of the United States. The appeal, in part, follows:

"We approach this subject as Americans and only as Americans. When this war broke out, we would have welcomed action by the president which would have eliminated all questions of party politics. It would have enabled us all to stand behind him to the end, without regard to anything except national considerations. Instead of this, partisan lines have been strictly drawn from the first, and now the president announces that only Democrats can be entrusted with future power, and only those Democrats who do his will. Because of this reduction on other patriotic Americans, we appeal for fair play."

"The next Congress will serve from March 4, 1919, to March 4, 1921. In that period:

"First, the war must be fought to unconditional surrender, unless this is achieved before."

"Second, the terms of world peace must be settled."

"Third, the Democratic administration after expending billions of treasure and exercising more absolute power than any administration in our history, must give an account of its stewardship."

"Fourth, the change from war conditions to peace must be brought about."

Reuter's agency has been informed that Great Britain has officially received definite peace proposals from Turkey, which are regarded as tantamount to unconditional surrender.

The British Government, Reuter's Limited says, today received definite proposals of peace from Turkey.

The Turkish armistice took effect at noon today.

ALLIED WAR COUNCIL IS READY TO DISCUSS IMPORTANT ISSUES

London, Oct. 31.—The preliminary conversations which lately have occupied the Allied representatives in Paris have been concluded, and more important discussions now are beginning, according to reports reaching official quarters here. To take part in the discussions, Andrew Bonar Law, chancellor of the exchequer, went to France yesterday, crossing the channel in an airplane, as he had done on a previous occasion.

The scope of the deliberations of the allied representatives has not been announced, and although, it is stated from reliable sources at Berlin Tuesday, referred to is a Copenhagen dispatch, quoting the Berlin Vossische Zeitung, was based upon press dispatches of Tuesday from London purporting to outline what would be demanded of Germany.

ARMISTICE TERMS RECOMMENDED BY FRENCH NEWSPAPER

Demands Surrender of Arms, Munitions and Submarines.

Paris, Oct. 31.—In an editorial discussing armistice terms L'Information suggests the following conditions:

"Internationalization of the Bosphorus and the Dardanelles."

"The occupation of enemy ports on the Adriatic."

"The surrender of Austrian warships."

"The right to use Austro-Hungarian railway lines."

"The evacuation of Alsace-Lorraine and territories wrongly occupied in the east and west."

"The surrender of arms, munitions and submarines."

"The occupation of fortresses and bridges along the Rhine and of Luxembourg and Essen."

"The removal of mines from territorial waters."

"The delivery, as a preliminary compensation, for damages, of part of the enemy merchant marine."

"The cessation of manufacturing for war purposes."

ALLIED ADVANCE IN SERBIA IS CAUSING ALARM IN BUDAPEST

Fears Are Entertained That Jugo-Slavs Will Cross Croatian Frontier.

Zurich, Oct. 31.—The rapid advance of the allies in Serbia is causing the liveliest alarm in Budapest according to a Vienna dispatch. It is feared that the Jugo-Slavs will cross the Croatian frontier, join the allied troops and march on the city. This is one of the reasons for the persistence with which Count Andrassy has asked for an armistice.
