# HOT LUNCH SERVED **AS DEMONSTRATION** OF WHAT SHOULD BE

Teachers See What Can Be Done at School.

HEALTH DEMANDS THIS

Children Suffer Because of Miserable Meals Swallowed at Noon.

The demonstration of hot lunches such as might be served in rural schools was the feature of the morning session of the Women's Institute con-vention, held in the Normal School, As well as the three hundred delegates present, 200 Normal students were also served by the department of agriculture, the lunch consisting of hot chocolate, sandwiches, cake and a banana, all neatly tied up in oiled paper and served from hoves. from boxes. The

demonstration was preceded by an address from A. H. Leake of Toronto, director of household science in rural schools.

"Forty-five per cent of our school children are educated in the rural schools, therefore the conditions there should be made the best possible. 
