"Be it, therefore, resolved that this "Be It, therefore, resolved that this board strongly discourages such procedure, and that if any definite complaints come before the board they will be referred to the arbitration committee for immediate investigation."

Any liquor transported contrary to the provisions of the bill may be seized and dealt with in the manner provided in the Ontario temperance act.

Specific mention is made that the act does not forbid sale, transportation or delivery of liquor for export from Ontario; transportation of liquor through Ontario from any place outside of the province to any other place outside of the province; sale and delivery of liquor by or under the order of the Ontario License Board for any purpose for which liquor may be lawfully sold, supplied or delivered under the provisions of the Canada temperance act and its amendments.

It is also specified that the act does not affect the right of the license board to purchase, import, sell, sunply or deliver liquor for any purpose permitted by the Canada temperance act, nor does it apply to the sale, carriage, transportation or delivery of native wines so far as the same may be lawful under the Ontario temperance act.
