## How Some Recent V. C.'s Won Chief Prize of War

Among new V. C.'s one gave up his life. It is recorded of Sgt. R. Downie, Royal Dublin Fusiliers, that at the critical moment he rushed forward alone shouting, "Come on, the Dubs!" Another winner of the supreme award is Sgt. James Young Turnbull, H. L. L., who was killed after winning the Cross.

V. C. Winners.

Lt. (Temp. Lt.-Col.) Roland Boys Bradford, M. C., Durham, L. I.

For most conspicuous bravery and good leadership in attack, whereby he saved the situation on the right flank of his brigade and of the division. Lt.-Col. Bradford's battalion was in support. A leading battalion having suffered very severe casualties and the commander, wounded, its flank became dangerously exposed at close quarters to the enemy. Lt.-Col. Bradford asked permission to command the exposed battalion in addition to his own. Permission granted. At once proceeded to the foremost lines. By his fearless energy under fire of all description, and his skillful leadership, the two battalions, regardless of all danger, he succeeded in rallying the attack, captured and defended the objective, and secured the flank.

Lt.-Col. Bradford is only twenty-four years old.

Temp. Sec. Lt. Tom Edwin Adams, Bedfordshire Regt. For most conspicuous bravery during operations. A portion of a village which had defied capture on the previous day had to be captured at all costs to permit subsequent operations to develop. This minor operation came under very heavy machine gun and rifle fire. Sec. Lt. Adams, realizing that time was all important, rushed from shell hole to shell hole under heavy fire, collecting men for a sudden rush, and for this purpose also collected many enemy grenades. At this juncture he was wounded in the leg, but nevertheless he was able to outthrust the enemy, and then seizing his opportunity, he rushed to the position, and killed the occupants. Throughout the day he continued to lead his men in bombing attacks. On the following day he again displayed courage of the highest order, and though again wounded, and unable to throw bombs, he continued to lead his men.

An Irishman's Battle Cry.

Temp. Sec. Lieut. Henry Kelly, West Riding Regt. For most conspicuous bravery in attack. He twice rallied his company under very heavy machine gun and rifle fire. He was wounded, but finally led the only three available men into the enemy trench, and there remained bombing until the trench was cleared of enemy and enemy reinforcements had arrived. He then carried his

company sergeant-major, who had been wounded, back to our trenches, a distance of seventy yards, and subsequently three other soldiers. He set a fine example of gallantry and endurance.

No. 1218, Sgt. Robert Downie, Royal Dublin Fusiliers. For most conspicuous bravery and devotion to duty in attack. When most of the officers had become casualties, this non-commissioned officer utterly regardless of personal danger moved about under heavy fire and re-organized the attack, which had been temporarily checked. At the critical moment he rushed forward alone, shouting, "Come on, the Dubs!" This stirring appeal met with immediate response, and the line rushed forward at his call. Sgt. Downie accounted for several of the enemy, and in addition captured a machine gun, killing the team. Though wounded early in the fight, he remained with his company, and gave valuable assistance whilst the position was being consolidated. It was owing to Sgt. Downie's courage and initiative that this important position, which had resisted four or five previous attacks, was won.

Sgt. Downie is a Glasgow man.

A Scottish Hero.

No. 15888, St. James Young Turnbull, late Highland Light Infantry. For most conspicuous bravery and devotion to duty, when, having with his party captured a post apparently of great importance to the enemy, he was subjected to severe counter attacks, which were continuous throughout the whole day. Although his party was wiped out and replaced several times during the day, Sgt. Turnbull never wavered in his determination to hold the post, the loss of which would have been very serious. Almost single-handed he maintained his position, and displayed the highest degree of valor and skill in the performance of his duties. Later in the day this very gallant soldier was killed whilst bombing a counter-attack from the parados of our trench.

No. 2442, Pte. Frederick Jeremiah Edwards, Middlesex Regt. For most conspicuous bravery and resource. His part of the line was held up by machine gun fire, and all officers had become casualties. There was confusion and indication of retirement. Pte. Edwards, grasping the situation, on his own initiative dashed out alone towards the gun, which he knocked out with bombs.

No. 8281, Pte. Robert Ryley, Middlesex Regt. For most conspicuous bravery and initiative during an attack. His company was held up by heavy rifle fire and all officers had become casualties. For want of leadership the attack was flagging. Pte. Ryley, realizing the situation, without a moment's thought for his own safety, dashed absolutely alone at the enemy trench, and by skillful manipulation of his Lewis gun, succeeded in clearing the trench.

## THE HOUSING PROBLEM

The Story of a Little Red House the Rent of Which is to be Advanced from \$10 to \$12 a Month On May 1.

"It's the little red house in the yard there. You can't miss it," and, despite the wild storm, the old man led the way, his finger pointing to it as so tiny a place that it was easily hidden by the few houses about and a remnant of scaffolding, weather-beaten and insecure, gave one the impression of bony fingers vainly trying to hide a shamed face.

The house, as it was called to distinguish it from the more dilapidated buildings of similar height and general contour on a line with it, set entrance to the street, and one entered a rickety gale to reach it. Despite its color, it had a striking appearance as though it would gladly hide itself. Its two tiny little windows were like slightly prominent eyes on a sunken face; its roof, with patches where the shingles were loose or missing and a patch of new shingles, looking like blotches on an unkempt face, was far from waterproof. ## Strong Ticket in Gloucester

At the convention of the opposition party for Gloucester county, which was held in Caracquet yesterday, more than 500 persons were in attendance and the spirit of the meeting augurs well for a sweeping success at the polls. The candidates selected are: P. J. Vniot, Bathurst; J. F. Byrne, Bathurst; J. G. Robichaud, Shippegan and C. R. Legere, Caracquet. A mass meeting in the interests of the opposition which was held in the evening was largely attended.

## TROUBLE OVER TICKET

The story of the government meeting here on Friday last is not one calculated to inspire joy in the supporters of the Fleming-Clack-Baxter-Murray administration. Obligated to adjourn the Moncton meeting on the preceding day, to a second session and then obliged at the second session to bring strong pressure to bear upon some of the candidates before they would agree to run, it must be evident to the government men that they cannot expect much from the voters when their own leaders are ashamed or afraid to come out in support of the clique which has been running New Brunswick for the past eight years.

It was to be expected that Mr. Mahoney would show a certain diffidence in coming forward. Mr. Mahoney went down to defeat on the record of the government last spring when he had the inducement of a portfolio back of him. It is a proof of his common sense that he hesitated about putting his name in nomination again after Westmorland county had been absolutely turned down by the Murray government and after the colleagues for whom he sacrificed himself at the bye-election had refused to take him into consideration at all. The people of Westmorland defeated Mr. Mahoney last spring because of the rotten government he supported, even though that government had offered this county the bribe of a portfolio. They will certainly not be inclined to elect Mr. Mahoney and his colleagues on the 24th.

## London Hotel-Room Scarce

(London Daily Mirror)

There is something of a famine in hotel accommodation in London.

The government's commandeering of so many of the largest of the hotels is filling those that remain to overflowing.

This exceptional lack of accommodation is causing a great deal of inconvenience, particularly to officers and men on short leave.

The latest hotel to be taken over by the government—for the use of the minister and his department—the Hotel Cecil, adds nearly 1,000 more rooms to the nearly 5,000 already requisitioned for war purposes.

The Hotel Cecil is one of the largest in the world.

Quite a number of people well known in public life, who have been resident in the hotel for five, and even ten years, will have to migrate elsewhere.

Among the hotels that have already been commandeered are the Metropole, Grand, Victoria, St. Ermin's, Great Central, Buckingham Palace, De Keyser's, Westminster Palace and the Salisbury, and the Daily Mirror understands that the government is still looking for more.
