THIRTEEN FROM LOWER PROVINCES NOW WILL HAVE THEIR OWN HOME

Nurses at Halifax on Way to War - Three From St. John - Several More Here Get Notice

Halifax, N. S., May 1.—Among the 100 nursing sisters who have enlisted for overseas service thirteen have been mobilized at Halifax. They are Miss Helen K. Mackay, superintendent of the Payson Memorial Hospital, Windsor, N. S.; Miss E. Maude Mosher, Halifax; Miss Nellie Hope, St. John; Miss N. E. L. McDonald, Halifax; Miss Edith McCafferty, St. John; Miss Nellie Donohue, St. John; Miss Alice M. Powers, St. John; Miss Minnie McAfee, Woodstock, N. B.; Miss Elsie Nicholson, Charlottetown, P. E. I.; Miss Hope Massey, Summerside, P. E. I.; Miss M. M. Orr, Newcastle, N. B.; Miss Beatrice Mack, Liverpool, N. S.

These thirteen nurses will form a draft of the 100 going from other parts of the dominion with the A. M. C. of the second contingent. They are all uniformed in blue with top coat of blue broad cloth. They rank lieutenants and wear the shoulder straps with two stars and the gilt buttons of the A. M. C.
