

## SAINT JOHN HARBOR GETS FINE BOOST IN LONDON PUBLICATION

Alex Gray, Federal Engineer, Writes Article  
That Is Profusely Illustrated, Taking Seven  
Pages of Issue—Editorial Gives Praise

THE port of Saint John is given much prominence in the October number of The Dock and Harbor Authority, a London, Eng., publication which has a wide circulation. It prints a profusely illustrated article from the pen of Alex. Gray, M. Inst., C. E., M. E. I. C., engineer in charge of the harbor of Saint John under the Federal Department of Public Works. The article and illustrations take up seven and a half pages of the publication.

At the outset Mr. Gray gives the location of the harbor and a resume of its history, telling of the discovery by Champlain. He refers to the bustling days of wooden shipbuilding when this port sent its clipper ships to all parts of the world and the name of Saint John was a familiar one on the seven seas. The relationship of the river to the harbor is also touched upon by Mr. Gray.

MANY ILLUSTRATIONS.  
The illustrations include pictures of the Reversing Falls, showing the highway and railway bridges across the gorge through which the waters of the river meet those of the harbor; a full page view of the harbor, showing the wharves on the east and west sides; sections of crib work which comprise the wharves and a number of views of the great dry dock located at Courtenay Bay.

In the article he also deals with the proposed developments in Courtenay Bay, where it is expected the Canadian National Railway will establish its terminals.

The equipment of the port is touched on and the protective measures which have been taken to ensure a safe harbor at all times to the ships coming here. He points out that the harbor is free from ice at all times of the year and that during the winter it is the chief port of the Dominion.

EDITORIAL PRAISE.  
The publication has the following editorial comment on this port: "Among the least familiar component parts of the great aggregate of territory forming the British Empire, Newfoundland, one of the provinces of the Dominion of Canada, occupies an important strategic position. Situated on the western littoral of the Gulf of St. Lawrence, at the extremity of the mainland, and flanking the eastern-most boundary of the United States, it is favorably endowed with a coastline possessing many fine bays and natural harbors. Not the least among these is the Harbor of Saint John, the chief port and principal commercial city, which is described and illustrated in this issue. Amid the extremes of temperature which characterize the climate of the province, Saint John has the good fortune to be a winter port and its rail connection with Montreal enables it to serve the Province of Quebec, when the great St. Lawrence port is sealed to navigation. "The tidal conditions in the Bay of Fundy, of which the Harbor of Saint John forms a branch, are rather remarkable, and producers of the probably the highest tides in the world."

## POSITION OF FARM HANDS HERE TALKED

Question Asked if British  
Workers in Canada Are  
Stranded.

LONDON, Oct. 28.—The position of British agricultural workers in Canada was raised at a meeting of the British Passenger Agents' Association here today, especially the question of whether British harvesters in Canada were stranded at the end of the season.

Secretary Wright, of the Passenger Agents' Association, who was with a party that recently toured Canada, asserted that sometimes the farm hands would not remain at work at the conclusion of the harvest in Western Canada, when they could do so, but instead of this they spent their money and got into financial difficulties. He was satisfied, he said, that there was enough work there to keep people employed all the year.

The report of the delegation that had made the tour in the Dominion gave a favorable account of the position of the settlers in the West who had emigrated from Great Britain under the Canadian Government's colonization scheme of ultimately settling 5,000 families on the land.

## Allan A. M. Saunders Dies At Age of 87

NEWCASTLE, Oct. 28.—The death of Allan A. M. Saunders occurred suddenly at his home, The Valley, Kirkwood, Monday, Oct. 26, at the age of 77 years. His wife, Eliza Henderson, died 23 years ago. Mr. Saunders, son of the late Alexander Saunders, was born at the old Saunders residence, which was erected in the year 1804. In his earlier years he conducted farming and milling operations. For many years he was a prominent figure in the community, having been a justice of the peace and county councillor. He is survived by three daughters, Mrs. Percy Keith, of Hazelton, N. B.; Mrs. Bert Clarke, of Morris Mills, Ont.; and Miss Janie, at home; and four sons, Frank Alexander, Earl and Odell, all at home. One sister, Miss Katherine Saunders, also survives. The services, which were conducted by Rev. W. J. Bate, of Newcastle, were held at the house, interment being made at the adjacent Saunders burial ground. Mrs. Alexis Danville, of Chatham, presided at the organ. The funeral was largely attended, the pall-bearers being Gregory Henderson, J. J. Clarke, John Betts, Michael Monahan, William Carahan and Lambert Flett.

## SEAMAN IS SLAIN

Stabbed to Death in Bunk;  
Another Sailor Held For  
Murder.
