Fredericton, Feb. 18—(Special)—The notice required by law, upon the managing director of The Gleaner, Limited, in the libel suit which is being instituted by R. B. Hanson, K. C. M. P., as the result of the publication of an editorial last week which accused him of unprofessional conduct as a barrister. The service of this notice is one of the legal formalities and at the expiration of five days if no retraction of the objectionable allegations are made, the service of a writ upon the same person will follow. No retraction is expected.

In the ordinary course of events this case would come up for trial in May at the sitting of the court of King's Bench for York county. The late Mr. Justice Chandler was assigned to that sitting at the first of the year. His death has left a vacancy which must be filled by some other member of the bench, but by whom is not yet known.

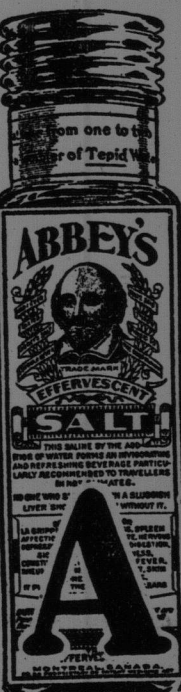
EYESIGHT OF CHILDREN

NEW BRUNSWICK PEOPLE DIVORCED

Four Decrees Made Absolute and One Partial at Capital

Fredericton, Feb. 18—Four decrees of absolute and one partial divorce were granted today by Mr. Justice Crockett at an adjourned session of the January sitting of the Divorce Court.

A decree of absolute divorce was granted to the plaintiff, Mrs. Alice Dionne, in her suit against George Dionne, of Perth, while an order for alimony amounting to \$800 per year was also made.

Absolute divorces were also granted in the St. John case of Gertrude Dunham vs. Murray Dunham, Fleming vs. Fleming, of Woodstock, and in the case of Sadie E. Carr vs. William F. Carr, parties of St. John.

A partial divorce only was granted in the case of Marilla Babineau vs. Joseph Babineau, the parties being former residents of Curryville, Albert county.

McADOO TO RUN FOR PRESIDENT

Chicago, Feb. 18—William Gibbs McAdoo will remain in the Democratic presidential nomination race if he abides by the decision of his supporters from 44 states here today.

Unanimous approval of his candidacy was voiced before the meeting recessed this afternoon.
