John Wilson Sentenged to Be Hanged at Prince Albert -His Statement.

(Canadian Press.) Saskatoon, Sask., Feb. 5—John Wil-ion was found guilty of murdering his wife, Mary Wilson, by a jury in king's court bench here late yesterday. Chief Justice Haultain immediately sentenced him to die upon the gallows at Prince Albert jail on April 23.

The jury deliberated one hour and fifty minutes. On receiving the verdict, Justice Haultain asked Wilson if he had anything to say. To this Wilson re-




