CHARGES OF ABUSES MADE

Printing Committee of U. S. Congress Presents Formidable List.

Washington, April 12—The joint congressional printing committee in a report made public charges that Roger W. Babson of Wellesley Hills, Mass., obtained the Official Bulletin, the committee's war publication, in March, 1919, by "secret connivance" with George Creel, former chairman of the committee on public information, and others "without the government receiving a cent in compensation," and urges that suit be brought to obtain "just compensation" for the government.

The report also charges numerous abuses in government publications, among which are:

Abuse of government funds, viz., printing of \$63,449,802 speeches of federal officials at an expense of \$442,798, consuming 1,452,070 pounds of paper.

Printing of 111 unauthorized publications, entailing an annual expense of \$120,000 and eight army and navy newspapers and magazines costing \$400,000, all of which since have been suppressed.

Use of propaganda favorable to the League of Nations, the liquor interests and officers in charge.

Advertisements including "get rich quick" oil speculations and political propaganda.

Abuse of government funds, viz., printing of \$63,449,802 speeches of federal officials at an expense of \$442,798, consuming 1,452,070 pounds of paper.

Printing of 111 unauthorized publications, entailing an annual expense of \$120,000 and eight army and navy newspapers and magazines costing \$400,000, all of which since have been suppressed.

VANCOUVER MAY EXPROPRIATE

Matter of Site for Proposed Pier on Burrard Inlet.

(Canadian Press)

Ottawa, April 12—The board of harbor commissioners at Vancouver may take immediate steps to expropriate property on Burrard Inlet for the construction of a proposed new pier. The site selected is that lying immediately west of the Great Northern Railway Company's dock and a portion of the property required is owned by a subsidiary company to the Great Northern.

Mr. MacKenzie, one of the Vancouver harbor commissioners, who has been in the capital negotiating with the railway, previously visited St. Paul and conferred with the Great Northern Railway Company, securing an undertaking to sell for a price in the vicinity of \$400,000 in cash, together with a promissory note for the balance, the title to the property on Burrard Inlet and Falsa Creek.

The department of marine, however, is not disposed to consider the question of granting a title to these properties as part of the purchase price.

SECEDES FROM THE REPUBLIC

State of Sonora at Odds With Government of Mexico.

Nogales, Sonora, April 12—The state of Sonora withdrew from the Republic of Mexico on Saturday. The state congress voted, according to reports, to reject with armed forces any attempt of the Carranza government of Mexico to send troops into the state. State authorities said the Mexican federal troops would be met with armed forces and civil war would result.

Sonora, state officials, headed by Governor Adolfo De La Huerta, declared that while the state had seceded it would return to the Mexican republic upon guarantees from the national administration that there would be no infringement of the state's rights by the federal government.

Spread of the secession movement to other states unless the Mexican government acts quickly was forecast here yesterday.

TORONTO HEAD OF BRADSTREET'S KILLED BY CAR

Charles A. B. Brown Run Down by an Automobile Whose Driver Did Not Stop.

Toronto, April 12—Charles A. B. Brown, local manager of Bradstreet's Mercantile Agency, president of the Canadian National Exhibition Association, a member of the board of education of this city for thirty-eight years, and an ex-chairman of the board of education, died here on Saturday from injuries received on the previous night, when he was knocked down by an automobile. He was born in Toronto and had been connected with Bradstreet's for forty years.

The driver of the car did not stop after the accident, and the police have been looking for him since.

Death of H. E. Peters.

Quebec, April 12—Henry Edwards Peters, secretary-treasurer of the Bennett-Martin Asbestos and Chrome Mines of Thetford Mines and Coleraine died yesterday at Thetford Mines in his fifty-fifth year.

HIGH RECORD FOR U. S. INTEREST

New Issues of Treasury Certificates at Five and Five and a Half.

Washington, April 12—A high record for interest rates on war or post war government securities was disclosed last night by Secretary Houston in announcing two new issues of treasury certificates of indebtedness, maturing in three and six months and bearing interest at five per cent and five and a half per cent respectively.

The new rates exceed the interest paid on the last issue of certificates by one-fourth and one-half per cent respectively, and treasury officials declared they were the highest paid on United States government obligations since the days of the Civil War.

Both of the new issues of certificates amount will be for \$250,000,000 or more and the federal reserve bank are authorized to make allotments in "full" on all subscriptions.

CANADA AND FOREIGN POLICY

Saskatoon, Sask., April 12—Saying that Canada has no representation in matters affecting foreign policy, Sir Robert Falconer, president of the Toronto University, addressing the Saskatoon Canadian Club, made a strong plea for such representation as soon as possible and maintained that to obtain the right kind of men to act in such a capacity, a special body of men trained in international law and diplomacy should be formed.

He recommended the formation of a special permanent service to handle these problems.
