RECEIVE COMMUNION FOR THE INTENTION OF FIELD MARSHAL FOCH

Baltimore, Oct. 21.—Speaking at the celebration today in honor of Cardinal Gibbons' fiftieth anniversary as a bishop, Mr. William Barnes, Catholic chaplain of Oxford University, England, asked the cardinal to appeal to the Catholic children of America to receive Communion on behalf of Marshal Foch, and told how that had been done by the English children when things looked darkest for the Allied cause.

He said that Marshal Foch had written him as follows:

"The act of faith which the children of Great Britain have made for my intention has profoundly touched me. Please express my gratitude to them and beg them to continue their prayers for the victory of our just cause."

Since that, said Mr. Barnes, Marshal Foch has sent the following:

"I am still depending on the prayers of the children. Ask them to go to Communion for me again and again."

Bishop Keating of Northampton, England, said that the Catholics of both America and England had been further united by their work in the common cause in the war.

M. de Carlier, Belgian minister to the United States, was among the guests, as was also Mr. Baundillart of the French Academy and rector of the Catholic University of Paris.

The British and French delegations expect to call at the White House in Washington tomorrow.



Gunner C. E. Irving.


