MUCH WHISKEY GOES INTO FLOOD

Five Thousand Barrels Lost in Kentucky

Warehouse Collapsed—Cincinnati Reports End of the Flood in Sight—Many Refugees—Conditions in General Should Improve

Louisville, Ky., April 2—A large warehouse of the Ruby Distillery Company in the western end of the city collapsed late last night, releasing to the river about 5,000 barrels of whiskey, valued at a quarter of a million dollars.

Had she been of the Catholic faith, he said, he could have sent her to the Home of the Good Shepherd, and he regretted that other denominations did not have a similar shelter for the caring of fallen ones.

BETTER LIGHTING FOR CITY IS PROPOSED

Commissioner McLellan Getting 30 New Lamps—Attention to The Old Burial Ground and Places in Outskirts
