Graham, of Toronto, and Miss Kathleen Wilson, eldest daughter of Dr. David and Mrs. Wilson, of Vancouver, took place in St. Saviour's church on Wednesday. The bride was given away by her father, and was attended by her two sisters, Miss Isabel and Miss Alice Wilson. Doctor Graham was attended by Dr. Algernon Wilson, of Toronto.

The bride wore a gown of ivory satin, the skirt draped over a petticoat of Eimerick lace and fastened on the left side with a handsome pearl and diamond ornament. The train was square, with one corner caught back with a horseshoe of orange blossoms. The bodice of Eimerick lace was veiled with tulle and embroidered with seed pearls, and a veil of the same lace was worn over a coronet of orange blossoms.
