London, June 14.—Two Canadian  
weddings were celebrated in London  
this week. That between Dr. Colin  
Graham, of Vancouver, second son of  
Mrs. W. B. Graham, of Toronto, and  
Miss Kathleen Wilson, eldest daughter  
of Dr. David and Mrs. Wilson, of Van-  
couver, took place in St. Saviour's  
church on Wednesday. The bride was  
given away by her father, and was at-  
tended by her two sisters, Miss Isabel  
and Miss Alice Wilson. Doctor Graham  
was attended by Dr. Algernon Wilson,  
of Toronto.

The bride wore a gown of ivory sat-  
in, the skirt draped over a petticoat of  
Limerick lace and fastened on the left  
side with a handsome pearl and di-  
amanté ornament. The train was square,  
with one corner caught back with a  
horseshoe of orange blossoms. The bod-  
ice of Limerick lace was veiled with  
satin and embroidered with seed pearls,  
and a veil of the same lace was worn  
over a coronet of orange blossoms. She  
carried a bouquet of white roses, lilacs,  
of the valley and white heather. The  
bridesmaids wore gowns of charmeuse  
dropped with shadow lace, and picture  
hats of black tulle trimmed with pink  
roses. A reception was held at the  
Hans Crescent Hotel, where the hon-  
ey-moon is being spent on the continent.

patient still has to keep exceedingly

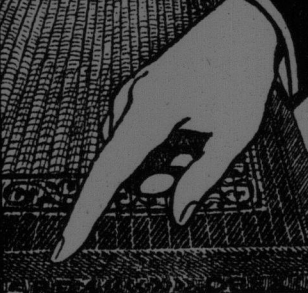

Douglas Jerrold who boldly stated that  
"What was talked of as the golden  
chain of Jove was nothing more than  
a succession of laughs, a chronic scale

of merriment reaching from earth to  
Olympus." "I am persuaded," wrote  
Lawrence Sterne, "that every time a  
man smiles—but much more so when  
he laughs—it adds something to his  
fragment of life." Last of all may be  
cited the verdict of Oliver Wendell  
Holmes, given with his own inimitable  
humor—"The riotous tumult of a laugh,  
I take it, is the mob law of the fea-  
tures, and Property the magistrate who  
reads the Riot Act."
