### BIG INCREASE IN CAPE BRETON COAL OUTPUT

(Gloucester Gazette.)  
The officials of the Dominion Coal Company anticipate that by the end of February the total output for the first two months of 1912 will show an increase of 30,000 tons over the corresponding period of last year. A similar increase is expected at the Springhill collieries, so that

combining the two districts, the coal output of the Dominion Coal Corporation will show an increase of, at least, 100,000 tons over the first two months of 1911. Although the amount of the 1912 output will depend entirely upon the sales made, and all the contracts have not yet been closed, the company expect this year an output of four and one-quarter million tons, an increase of 230,000 tons over 1911.

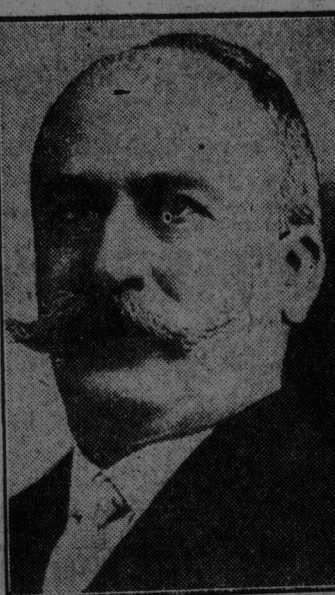

### THE LIQUOR LAW

Delegations Heard By the Government in Session in St. John Yesterday

A bill providing for the total prohibition of the sale of liquor within the province was submitted to the provincial government yesterday afternoon by a delegation of three with offices in St. John. The enforcement of the act is laid upon the municipalities, with the exception of the expense of bringing cases to trial. The penalties for violations are very severe, including two and three years imprisonment without the option of a fine.

Every prisoner arrested on the charge of drunkenness would be questioned by the magistrate as to where he obtained liquor, and refusal to answer would be taken as contempt of court. All fines recovered under the act would be paid into the treasury of the municipality.

The amendments to the present law which were argued are as follows:  
1. Closing of all bars at 7 o'clock except on Saturday evening, which is to remain at 8.  
2. Making collection of accounts for liquor sold retail impossible.

3. Definition of clause relating to bars being seen from the outside so that there can be no question of "outside" meaning the street.  
4. Creation of commission for proper inspection and imposing of heavy penalties for detection of irregularities in labelling liquor.

5. Making it more difficult to obtain license by increase in number of applications.

### FIRST NATIONAL ROAD

Windsor to Quebec Said to Be First Section Under Government Plan

Ottawa, Feb. 23.—Hon. Frank Cochrane, minister of railways, it is learned, is making headway with the working out of the details of the government's plan for the improvement of the highways of the country. It is understood that the government has practically decided to adopt as its model the national highway system of France, where there are both government and municipal roads, the government highways being the main arteries of traffic.

The first great highway to be constructed will be one running along the north shore of Lake Erie and Ontario, following the St. Lawrence River down, perhaps, from Windsor to the city of Quebec.

Andrew Broder, member of the House of Commons, who has taken much interest in the government proposal, will confer with James Whitney, and if arrangements can be made with the Ontario government, a commencement on this undertaking will not long be delayed. Quebec also will likely co-operate in the work.

It is practically certain that A. W. Campbell, deputy minister of railways, who was for some years good roads commissioner for the Ontario government, will be in charge of the national system of highways.

### RECENT DEATHS

Ottawa, Feb. 23.—Hon. William Miller, P. C. K. C., the last of the senators appointed by royal proclamation in 1867, died this afternoon at 181 Liger street.

He sustained a stroke of paralysis about a month ago. His iron constitution helped him to rally at times, but the end came unexpectedly. At the wish of the deceased he will be buried at Antigonish (N. S.), his birthplace. No date has been set for the funeral as yet.

The many friends of Mr. and Mrs. Glen L. Delve, of 110 Adelaide street, will sympathize with them in the loss of their infant daughter, which occurred Thursday.

Walter Byron Gilchrist, the sixteen months old son of Mr. and Mrs. Murray Gilchrist, of Apohaqui, died at his parents' home there yesterday morning. He was accidentally scalded on Thursday afternoon by pulling a dipper of hot water on himself. Besides his parents, three brothers and one sister survive. The funeral will take place on Sunday.

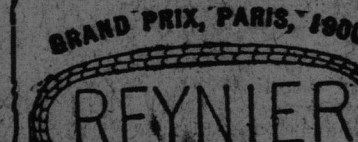

### FAMILY RECORD AND MEDICAL CERTIFICATE TO GET MARRIAGE LICENSE

London Physician's Advice, He Says, Would Result in Less Talk of Divorce

London, Feb. 24.—Family pedigree and medical certificates both for brides and grooms, as a necessary qualification for marriage, are advocated by Doctor Fredgold in an address to the Eugenics Education Society. This suggestion leaves the idea of certificated brides far behind and is likely to provoke a large amount of discussion from widely divergent standpoints.

Whatever may be said about the suggestion, Doctor Fredgold is well qualified to speak upon the subject. He is consulting physician to the National Association for the Care of the Feeble-Minded, and was a medical expert to the royal commission on the feeble-minded.

If the race was to advance some forms of selection must clearly take the place of natural selection, he urged, and the only form was birth selection. No person should be allowed to marry without a

license, which should be granted after medical examination of the individual as an inquiry into his or her family history. This would necessitate the notification of particulars of the birth, mental and physical condition, presence of disease, as cause of death, etc., of every individual to a central national record office.

In this office the notification would be compiled into a personal history sheet, as the relationship of different individuals would be readily traced by a system of cross references. He was convinced, added, that a very large amount of the wretchedness of home life resulted from hasty, ill-considered marriages, regardless of the character and mental and physical health of the contracting parties. If greater attention were paid to these and to a general responsibility attaching to marriage they would hear very much about the need for divorce.

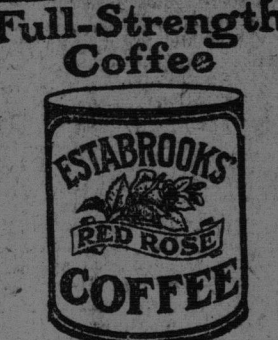
