**BUSINESS MEN'S CONGRESS, DECLARES THE NEW SPEAKER**

Washington, April 7—(Canadian Press)—The present session of congress is going to be a business man's session, according to Champ Clark, speaker of the House. In an interview here today he outlined the tariff programme of the Democrats as a response to fears expressed by alarmists that business conditions might be upset by the legislation which the Democrats planned.

The tariff legislation is to be of scientific character. "There is nothing in the Democratic programme to alarm or scare any legitimate business in the United States," declared the speaker. "No sane man within the confines of the republic would want to pass any laws that would interfere with any legitimate business but no man who has the welfare of the republic at heart wants to collect an exorbitant tariff on articles of general consumption by the United States people."

At least 200 and possibly 300 of the items in the Payne-Aldrich act provide duties over 40 per cent. The Democrats propose to eliminate these duties.

"By taking the various tariff laws beginning with the Morrill act, passed just after the war, we can determine the minimum duties that will produce the revenue needed by the government. We will first determine what amount of revenue is needed, and then we will decide on the duties that will bring in that amount."

**SENATOR FORGET**  
Senator (Hon. Louis S.) Ferguson's death is reported in Montreal. He was born at Terrebonne, March 11, 1850. He was president of the Montreal St. Barthelemy Club and a director of the Montreal Light, Heat and Power Company. He was elevated to the senate in June, 1906. He was a Conservative.

**INSANE MEN IN AN ASYLUM PLUNGE WATER INTO BOILING WATER**

Attendant in Worcester Hospital is Arrested on Technical Charge Because of the Occurrence

Worcester, Mass., April 7—For allowing two insane men to plunge a fellow inmate of the state hospital at Lake Quinsigamond into a bath tub filled with boiling water, inflicting scalds from which the victim may die, Thomas J. Brennan, aged 32, an attendant at the hospital is under arrest on a technical charge of assault and battery, but being demanded in the sum of \$100 because of the critical condition of the scalded man.

The victim is Ralph K. Stewart of North Uxbridge, an aged and almost helpless inmate of the hospital. In response to a complaint made to the police by Dr. Moses M. Quinlan of the hospital, the police made an investigation and, according to Inspector O'Day, they found that the attendant was taking Stewart to the bath room to give him a bath and on the way his attention was required by a dangerous inmate who had got out of his room.

Brennan and another attendant had to work a long time to get the second man back into bed, but before leaving Stewart, Brennan called a couple of mildly insane men to watch Stewart and wheel him to the bathroom.

The insane men did more than they were asked to do. They filled the bath tub with boiling water and dropped the helpless old man into the tub so that the lower part of his body was terribly scalded. In the meantime, Brennan and his fellow attendant had got the dangerous insane man back into his room, but Brennan forgot all about Stewart and went off duty at 10 o'clock, as his tour of duty was ended at that hour. Stewart's predicament was discovered by other attendants, who hurried him to the medical ward where everything possible was done for him, but the doctors hold out little hope for his recovery.

Brennan is much worked up over the affair. He has been at the hospital for a long time and has enjoyed the reputation of being one of the most efficient attendants there. He says he had special orders to look after the dangerous man who has the habit of cutting himself and giving opportunity, and as his relatives complained about his treatment, he was given special care. Brennan nearly collapsed when being booked.
