

Florist's and Other Premises in Charlotte Street

Auto Crashes Through Plate Glass Window Rushing One Proprietor to Store

Considerable damage was done to the rear of the store of K. Pedersen, Ltd., florist, 36 Charlotte street, and the stock was ruined by fire which broke out about 4.45 o'clock this morning. The barber shop of C. A. Gurney as well as a club room on the second floor were also damaged by fire while the Maritime Dental Parlors and Lugrin's Studio suffered from smoke. Smoke also did slight damage in the store of Herman Merzetti next door.




