encouraging degree of religious interest. The Faculty is full and thoroughly efficient, and the various departments were never in better con-

dition for effective work.

The donation of the late Dr. Gould, of Colborne, and the liberal bequest of \$10,000 by the late Hart A. Massey, Esq, of Toronto, give great encouragement and cheer to the Board of Management. The agency for the Relief Fund, under the vigorous efforts of Rev. J. P. Rice is showing good results, and the returns, while not as large as could be desired, are still encouraging.

One thing essential to larger success in this agency is, that at least some of the territory adjoining the London Conference should be opened by Conferential action to our representative, so that he may at all times have a sufficient number of uncanvassed fields before him to keep him constantly employed without interfering with any local interest that may be, for the time, of paramount importance to the circuit and minister.

The special needs of the school are, (1) a speedy relief from the financial burdens resting upon it; (2) a heartier co-operation and more active sympathy on the part of Methodist ministers and people in making its great advantages and moderate rates better known to the people.
