The Allied Fleet Now Sailing Towards Turkey.

LONDON, Nov. 23.—The persistent refusal of the Turkish government to accept European control of the revenues of the vilayets of Macedonia, notwithstanding the ultimatum presented by the allied powers, is about to lead to the putting into operation of the threat of a naval demonstration with the view of compelling the acquiescence of Turkey in the European control of the administration of proposed reforms in Macedonia. The ultimatum of the Sultan apparently is based on the belief that he has the passive support of the Emperor of Germany and upon the jealousy supposed to exist among the powers. In diplomatic circles it was supposed the Sultan would yield and he would do so before decided action had been taken by the fleet. It is understood that the Sultan appeals vainly to Emperor William, Emperor Nicholas and Emperor Francis Joseph against the projected demonstration. The combined fleets of the powers now assembling at Piræus consists of six large and four smaller vessels, commanded by Admiral Ritter von Jellina.

PROSECUTIONS ARE LIKELY TO FOLLOW And Big Hardware Firms Taking Precautions.

TORONTO, Nov. 23.—The examination of the books and other documents in the offices of Jenkins & Hardy, Toronto street, which has been in progress since Saturday last, has been concluded, and Crown Attorney Curry has had the remainder of the books and documents he considered it advisable to retain, removed to the Court street police station. What the nature of the information is, which Curry has secured from his brief examination of these books and documents he refuses to say, but this much is absolutely certain, that a number of prosecutions will follow. It is possible, however, that just one case will be laid before the magistrate first, and then if a conviction is recorded, every known combine in the city will at once be proceeded against.

Following is one of the combine agreements printed in connection with the reports of the inquiry now going on:

Dear Sirs—We send you the following agreement (two copies), which we will thank you to sign, retaining one copy yourselves and mailing the other at once to Jenkins & Hardy, 151-2 Toronto street. Toronto, receipt and acknowledgment of same by them being necessary to constitute this a binding agreement.

AGREEMENT. Provided that you shall have complied with the following conditions, viz:

1. That you shall not have bought or received any: Tarred Felt, Roof Coating, Slaters Felt, Tarred Felt, Two and three-ply Ready Roofing, Carpet Felt, Dry Fibre, Resin Slat, O. K. and I. X. L., Dry sheathing (gray or straw), Turf-sheathing (gray or straw), Oiled Sheathing, Heavy Straw Sheathing, Roofing Felt, Shingle Varnish, Tar, Gas Pitch, made by any manufacturers other than the undersigned.

2. That you shall have duly settled for all your purchases of said goods from said manufacturers in conformity with the established prices and terms as fixed from time to time by the Tarred Paper Manufacturers' Association.

3. That you shall not have offered or sold any of the said goods, either directly or indirectly, at less than said established prices and terms.

4. In the event of any complaint or claims being lodged with the said Jenkins & Hardy, with respect to any alleged violation of this agreement, you shall be bound to pay to them the sum of \$100.00 as damages.

5. Hardy that the charge or charges made against you are incorrect, you shall be bound to pay to them the sum of \$100.00 as damages.

6. That you shall be bound to pay to them the sum of \$100.00 as damages in the event of your failure to comply with the above conditions.

Political axe falls on another head.

MONCTON, Nov. 23.—The Westmorland county court meets at Dorchester on Tuesday next, Judge Wells presiding.

The Grand Trunk Pacific party coming this way is now within four or five miles of Moncton. This is the fourth survey made, and much tramping of the survey parties is reported to be wearing out the ground, while the forest trees are blazed in all directions.

The political axe has fallen at Lewis Mountain. Arthur Lounsbury has been removed from the postmastership of that place and Calvin Lounsbury appointed in his place. No complaint was made against the former postmaster, and the majority of the residents of the district, irrespective of political leanings, are greatly annoyed at the removal.

The only reason for the change is the suspicion that the decaipitated official voted against Mr. Emmerson at the last election, which is sufficient in the opinion of that big-hearted and broad-minded statesman to warrant the use of the axe.

A novelty in the way of tramps struck Moncton last night, being a couple man and his wife. They gave their names as O'Brien and said they had walked from Nova Scotia and were bound for Quebec via the Miramichi. They had evidently been married only a short time and carried all their belongings in two small bundles.

The husband said he expected to get work in Quebec.

William McKinnon, an I. C. R. employee, while at work in the machine shop yesterday afternoon, had one of his feet severely crushed by a heavy axle falling on it. His toes were badly crushed, and the great toe had to be amputated.

Everett Blackwood, committed for trial on a charge of manslaughter, will come before the county court at Dorchester next Tuesday.

CHATHAM, N.S., Nov. 23.—Str Charles F. Mayer, from Boston for Baltimore, which passed here late this afternoon, took an unknown two-masted schooner in tow off Monmouth Point and proceeded westward with her. The schooner passed the point this afternoon and anchored near the Harriet, her chief lightship and she appeared to be very low in the water and apparently leaking. REMAINDER OF THE ROYAL GARRISON

Embark on Dominion Liner Kennington for England—Sail Today.

HALIFAX, N. S., Nov. 23.—The remainder of the Royal Garrison Regiment and the Royal Artillery were embarking today on the Dominion Line steamer Kennington for England, which will sail tomorrow. This removes all of the Imperial Garrison except 200 of the Royal Engineers, for whose departure no date has yet been fixed, and places the garrison practically in the hands of the Canadian militia department. Major General Sir Chas. Parsons is still in command and will probably stay till next spring, but largely in an advisory capacity. With him also are his staff officers. Halifax has been garrisoned by British troops since its foundation in 1764.
