GRADUALLY GETTING FACTS
IN THE KINRADE MURDER

Hamilton Police Learn of a Suspicious Character Seen
Hanging About the Home of the Murdered Girl—
Motive for Crime Still a Mystery

HAMILTON, Mar. 1.—Although the Kinrade murder, five days after the tragedy, is apparently "solved" in as much mystery as when the police first took hold of the case, there is good reason to believe there will be developments before the inquest on Wednesday evening and developments of a sensational nature. The authorities, while still declaring that they admit they have made little progress, admit that they are more hopeful than at any time since the murder was committed. There is no lack of corroborative evidence that a man, whose suspicious actions attracted the attention of other people, was hanging around the house the night before the murder. People are beginning to talk now and the police have been furnished with information which will be sifted to the bottom. Was the murder premeditated? The police are now asking themselves that question. Mrs. Kinrade, when reporting to the police the actions of a man who had alarmed the family by

his strange actions, told Detective Inspector McLaughlin that on the previous Sunday evening when Ethel was coming from church, a fellow stood close to the house on the walk and when her daughter approached put an umbrella up to hide his face. The weather was cold that night and there was no reason why a man should have an umbrella.

HEARD DR. RAYMOND ON

CONSTRUCTING SHELTERS
FOR EARTHQUAKE VICTIMS

Some Thousands of Houses are Being Erected in Messina and Reggio—
Queen Helena at Work.

MESSINA, March 1.—The work of constructing wooden houses with material sent out from America, to shelter the earthquake survivors, is progressing favorably under the direction of Lieut. Commander Balkup, U. S. naval attaché in Berlin and Rome. A large portable house already is in use as a store room and headquarters. The lack of carts and horses has made the transportation of lumber from the dock to the point of erection both slow and expensive. It costs \$4,000 to deliver enough to build five hundred houses. It has been decided to build 1,000 houses in Messina, 1,000 in Reggio and 100 in the settlement called Regina Elena, the village three miles from here being constructed under the personal direction of Queen Helena.

After the service the remains were forwarded to Dr. McDonald's late home in Hampstead, accompanied by Mr. Beatty, who will conduct the service at the place tomorrow.

EMPEROR WILLIAM ON
THE PLATFORM AGAIN

Praises the War Department for its Efficient Work in Germany.

BERLIN, Mar. 1.—Emperor William delivered a speech today in connection with the centenary of the foundation of the ministry of war, in which he praised the work done for the fatherland by this governmental department. "I am proud to testify that this ministry has fully satisfied all expectations and that it has performed its duties with great fidelity and sacrifice and ignoring fatigue," he said. "It has prepared and strengthened the army so that the military forces always have been capable of fulfilling their great task as the strong and unconquerable protector of the fatherland."

PATRICK APPEARS IN COURT

NEW YORK, Mar. 1.—Lawyer Albert T. Patrick, serving a life sentence for the murder of Wm. Marsh Rice, the aged millionaire, left Sing Sing prison today to appear before the Appellate Division of the Supreme court of Brooklyn on a writ of habeas corpus. Patrick hopes to argue his own case contending that he either deserves death in the electric chair or freedom because his conviction to life imprisonment was illegal.

DOWNIE CASE RESUMED.

The Downie case was resumed in the police court at two o'clock this afternoon with Detective Killen as the first witness. The detective told of working on the case and of a conversation with Downie, who said that he did not know who caught him by the throat, and that he knew nothing more of what happened. When he heard some one behind him he thought it was Woods, the shipping clerk, coming for orders, and so did not turn around. He suddenly saw the dark shadow of a sleeve and felt himself being choked into insensibility.
