TOMFOHED ESTATE WORTH \$1,000,000 IMPROVEMENT OF CHATHAM BUILDINGS

Dominion Government Se-cures Property Adjoining Post Office Building—Good Progress With R.R.

Chatham, Sept. 28.—The property next the post office belonging to Samuel Johnston, has been acquired by the Dominion government at a cost of \$2800. The additional ground thus secured, will be used in extending the present government building and provide additional facilities for the post office, customs and public works department, all three of which are much overcrowded now. The present building will be torn down and it is understood that the addition will be of the same style of architecture and material as the present post office, so that the two buildings will harmonize.

W. B. McKenzie, chief engineer of the I. C. R., and other officials were in town yesterday looking over the route of the new road into the town and inspecting the work already done. Mr. McKenzie expressed himself well satisfied with the progress being made. In a few days the contractors' camp will be moved to the new location close to Bacon road, and work will be carried on on the lower end. The right of way has been cleared and fenced off as far as the cemetery. Still Cut Off. The telephone cable to Partridge Island has not been repaired yet. Divers were at work yesterday trying to locate the trouble.
