

## MUSIC AND IMPRESSIVE SERMONS IN CHURCHES EASTER SUNDAY

Exceptionally Fine Programmes of Sacred Music — Churches Beautifully Decorated with Lilies and other Flowers—Many Forceful Addresses Marked Occasion.

Special services marked Easter Sunday in the local churches when sermons appropriate to the occasion were delivered, and splendid programmes of Easter music rendered.

**Leinster Street Baptist.**  
Special services marked the celebration of Easter at the Leinster street Baptist church. In connection with the services there was a fine musical programme. At the morning service the pastor Rev. Wellington Camp, baptized three candidates, and at the evening service twenty-four persons were admitted to fellowship in the church—eight by letter and sixteen by previous baptism. Dr. Edwin Crowell, formerly editor of the Maritime Baptist, preached the sermon at the evening service, dealing with the message of Easter.

**Carmarthen Street.**  
The Easter services in Carmarthen street Methodist church were marked by special music of high order rendered by a choir of about seventy voices. The decorations of Easter lilies and cut and potted flowers of many kinds presented a beautiful appearance, reflecting great credit on the ladies who had the preparations in charge.

At the morning service J. S. Woodworth of Winnipeg, secretary of the Canadian Welfare League, delivered an impressive sermon. Rev. D. J. Deimstad conducted the evening service.

**Queen Square Methodist.**  
Easter Sunday was observed as "Go to Church Sunday" at the Queen Square Methodist church, and the services both morning and evening were largely attended. A great many strangers were present at the services including visitors to the city and many who seldom go to church. The musical service was specially prepared for the occasion, and the work of the

large choir was much appreciated by all. At the morning service the pastor Rev. Wilfred Gastz preached a striking sermon, dealing with the lesson and purpose of the celebration of the Easter Festival. At the evening service one candidate was baptized and thirteen persons were received into the church.

**Congregational Church.**  
The Easter services in the Congregational church were of a very interesting character. The church was beautifully decorated with flowers and there were unusually large congregations at both services. At the evening service three persons were baptized and fellowship was extended to fourteen people. The pastor, Rev. Ralph Houghton spoke from the text of Isaiah 33:17: "Thine eyes shall see the King in His beauty they shall behold the land of far distances."

"Among other things Easter brings to us the message of a glorious and blessed hope," he said. "It comes with the assurance of a life beyond. Philip Brooks said life here is a part, not a whole. It is worth while to struggle, however, shapeless and crude the work when we lay it down for there is a tomorrow coming. Yes, there is a tomorrow coming, and this is the message of Easter. 'Thine eyes shall see the King in His beauty; they shall behold the land of far distances.'"

"Easter Day bids us put something in our lives besides transitory material, perishing things. Build 'thine no more earthly mansions, O my soul. Easter Day says give the soul a chance. All around us we see men and women making provision for time and laying up treasures for themselves on earth. There was a special Sunday school service during the afternoon with the largest attendance on record. The pupils took up a special offering for missions amounting to \$16.

## BREAKWATER DAMAGED BY HEAVY GALE

Structure on West Side of Courtenay Bay Partly Torn away by Seas on Saturday Evening.

The winds and heavy sea of Saturday evening caused considerable damage to the L. C. R. breakwater on the west side of Courtenay Bay and near the foot of Orange street. This breakwater, which is in connection to the L. C. R. track running around the bay from Barrack Point to the cotton factory, and it was estimated yesterday by a carpenter contractor that as it stands now it will cost in the vicinity of two thousand dollars to put the breakwater in the condition that it was before it was broken and torn away by the heavy sea.

Previous tides during the fall and winter have caused destruction to the breakwater. A hole had been torn in the side of it, and this gave the water a chance to wash in and loosen the above portions of the structure. The strong high tide and gale of Saturday evening completed the destruction. In past years it has been necessary to repair the breakwater about every year, but the last time it was repaired more care was taken to try and prevent the further destruction. It was necessary now, however, to spend considerable money in the reconstruction in order to give the protection that was before afforded the track running around the bay.

The sea on Saturday evening washed right through the breakwater seal, tearing the heavy rock filling and the heavy uprights and strong hardwood timber were washed away. As it is now the outer end of the breakwater a stretch of about one half its length is a mess of scattered stone, all the upper woodwork having been carried away and at high tide the sea washes through the protection wall.

## ADVOCATES HIGH PARK EXTENSION

J. S. Woodworth, of Winnipeg, before Centenary and Germain Street Brotherhoods.

The members of the Centenary and Germain Street Brotherhoods united in a meeting in the Germain street institute yesterday when J. S. Woodworth of Winnipeg addressed them on social service subjects.

Mr. Woodworth first took up the matter of immigration and pointed out that many foreigners were coming into Canada. Only last year nearly half a million were added to the population by immigration. These people formed one of the greatest problems of the country. The Christian people had to do with the problem. Some thought that these were only foreigners and that anything was good enough for them. The Canadian people were responsible for the country and must do something in the way of giving these new citizens a wider range of life.

He spoke of the conditions in the foreign districts in large cities and he urged the need of better housing conditions. Every workman should be entitled to a house of his own and he thought that many of the problems of this country would be solved when this was brought about. In St. John there was a foreign district and the housing problem was quite acute here.

**Church Work Extension.**  
He made a strong plea for the extension of church work along broader lines. At present in many towns and cities there were no places of recreation for the young people outside of the hotels and pool rooms and these moving picture houses. He advocated picture houses in the school buildings. These pictures could be of the instructive kind and would help to teach the people in general some of the methods of improving the community.

Town planning was another feature that would help to solve some of the great housing problems.
