

POLICE COURT BUSINESS

Ordinary Monday morning cases before the Magistrate.

The proceedings in the police court yesterday were of ordinary interest. James O'Dell, who was arrested for stealing a watch valued at \$12 from William Mudge on the 25th of October, pleaded not guilty. He was remanded till Tuesday morning.

Charles Jones, arrested by Officer Robert, of the I. C. R. police, for being drunk and begging from passengers at the Union Depot, pleaded guilty. He was allowed to go on payment of \$8. The magistrate warned Jones that if he was seen entering a liquor saloon he would be liable for the \$50 fine which was allowed to stand against him on the charge of begging.

Louis Kennedy, who was arrested on a warrant on the charge of breaking windows, drunkenness, profane language, obscene language and assault, was found guilty. The complainant testified that Kennedy was lying drunk in her hall, and that when she asked him to move out he had cursed her and used obscene language and had struck her. When he got outside the door, he smashed in the glass in the front door, and also smashed two other panes. The magistrate told the prisoner, who is but eighteen years old, that he was liable to fines amounting to \$44, or almost a year's term in the jail. He was allowed out on the payment of \$5 on condition that he would take the pledge until he was thirty years of age.

One drunk was allowed to go on paying his fine of \$8.

Percy Clark, who was arrested on a warrant charging him with assaulting Edward J. Watson, gained his liberty by depositing \$20.

Y. M. C. A. ACTIVITIES.

A new and interesting feature of work at the Y. M. C. A. will be inaugurated soon, as a boys' evening school will be opened. This school will be for boys who have not had an opportunity to finish their school course. The school will be conducted by Roy A. Davidson, a graduate of McGill.

The subjects will include arithmetic, writing, spelling, composition, and the class will meet two nights a week from 7.30 to 9.30. One of the features will be the fact that personal attention will be given to every student. It is also planned to have a series of social evenings in connection with the school and at other times to have some of the outstanding business and professional men of the community give talks along vocational lines.

The second series of Sunday morning meetings for boys was held at ten o'clock Sunday morning, about forty boys being present. The speaker was the boys' work secretary, P. J. Legge, who spoke briefly, using as his subject, "Why is a boy like a leaf?" He made four points: (1) Because he has an inside and an outside, a body and soul corresponding to the wood and the leaf; (2) Because he can be sharpened or educated; (3) Because he can be polished or cultivated the qualities of a gentleman, and (4) Because as a pencil is of no practical use when not held in the hand and directed by it, so a boy's life to be useful one must be guided and controlled by God so that he may make a mark in the world that will count.

To Winter Here.

Commissioner Russell yesterday gave permission for the steamer Prince George to moor for the winter at the extension to No. 7 berth, West St. John. Last year she laid up for the winter in Yarmouth, where repairs were made. Commissioner Russell thought the city should have any revenue that might come from keeping the steamer here.

SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION IN SUSSEX

N. B. and P. E. Island Sunday School workers have interesting programme—Special attention to Boys' work.

The thirty-first annual convention of the New Brunswick Sunday School Association will be held from Tuesday to Thursday of next week in the town of Sussex. All the regular sessions will be convened in Church Avenue United Baptist church. The programme, touching almost every phase of Sunday School, and extending among the speakers leading men of all denominations. A special feature of this year's convention will be the attention given to work among boys of the teen years, two sessions on the subject of the convention being devoted entirely to consideration of this particular department. Another feature of the convention, a little off the beaten path, will be the speakers at the second day devoted to denominational rallies, in which the delegates of the several churches will get together in church groups to discuss under a leader the work of their own respective denominations. Rev. W. H. Barracklow of St. John will conduct the Methodist rally, Rev. J. A. MacKellan will conduct the Presbyterian rally, and Rev. J. S. Nowlan the Baptist rally, while others will be arranged for as necessary.

Rev. Wellington Camp of Leinster St. Baptist Church, St. John, F. J. Matthews, St. John, will take part in the elementary conference, and Rev. W. A. Ross, General Secretary of the Association, and Rev. J. S. Nowlan, the Baptist Sunday School Secretary, will be the speakers at a conference of superintendents and pastors. Among the platform speakers for the evening meetings will be Rev. H. E. Thomas of St. John, F. J. Matthews, St. John, H. A. Goodwin of Moncton, W. F. Parker and Mayor McKay of Sussex, while Principal Clarence Mackinnon of Halifax Presbyterian College will deliver the closing address on Thursday evening, and also an address on the Psychology of Conversion on the preceding afternoon.

Other speakers during the course of the convention will be Rev. H. R. Boyer, secretary of the Bible Society, and Mr. A. S. McAllister, Maritime Secretary of the Y. M. C. A. In addition to the several superintendents of organized departments of the Y. M. C. A. The special representative from the International S. S. Association this year is John L. Alexander of Chicago, superintendent of the secondary division. He will be present at all sessions and every session and conference from him. Mr. Alexander is a specialist in work among the boys of the adolescent period, enjoying a high reputation in the world wide Sunday school field. An honor graduate in philosophy from Edinburgh University, Mr. Alexander has been largely on this continent. He was for some time in charge of the Boys' Department of the Y. M. C. A. in Philadelphia, from which post he was chosen to be the executive secretary of the American Department of the Boy Scouts movement, initiated by General Baden-Powell, latter taking a large share in the latter part of the growth of the Religion Movement in the United States in 1912. During the convention Mr. Alexander will deliver seven addresses and lead four different conferences, besides addressing a men's noon-day luncheon on Wednesday.

A MADE IN CANADA CAMPAIGN FOR WOMEN.

Canada is sending her soldiers to the help of the Motherland and those of us who are left behind are asking how we too can help.

One method of rendering valuable assistance is the maintenance of prosperity throughout the Dominion. There is a large scale of unemployment on a large scale this winter, and this unemployment can be successfully lessened if the demand for Canadian products is maintained and Canadian factories are kept open.

Perhaps the ordinary housewife does not realize how much she can help in a movement of this kind. The accompanying pamphlet will show her how many articles have ordinarily come from Germany and Austria and by demanding Canadian made goods in the place a large number of factories can be maintained and many workmen and women employed.

Even for these listed articles the value of goods annually imported is one hundred million dollars. In other words the housewife by demanding goods made in Canada can divert at least one hundred million dollars to Canadian manufacturers and can help Canada work this winter to perhaps one hundred thousand work people.

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WIDER SCOPE FOR BELGIAN RELIEF WORK

Provincial Committee to take charge of the collections for the Belgians.

G. E. Barbour, secretary of the Belgian Relief Committee, in a communication received yesterday from Acting Premier Clarke, was notified of the organization of a permanent committee to organize and direct Belgian relief work in the province.

The committee is composed of Hon. John E. Wilson, D. Mullin, Belgian Consul; Richard O'Leary, Richibucto; Irving R. Todd, Millville; Dr. T. Carleton Allen, Fredericton; Senator Daniel, Mayor Prink, and G. E. Barbour, St. John.

In addition to this committee, the representative of the province, secured the consent of the following to act as patrons of the movement: Lieutenant Governor Wood, the Bishop of Fredericton, the Bishop of St. John, the Bishop of Chatham, Rev. G. Pringle, Andover; Moderator of the St. John Presbytery, Rev. A. Reddie, Millville; Moderator of the Miramichi Presbytery, Rev. J. E. Whiteman, Bathurst; President of the Methodist Conference, Rev. John E. Wilson, Fredericton; President of the United Baptist Association, and Rev. R. J. Haughton of the Congregational church.

The committee will probably ask that those who have been sending in potatoes, apples and other perishable goods curtail these gifts, as the season is now too late for their shipment without serious loss. The committee will put the whole work on a practical basis and make it truly representative of the province.

The Provincial Committee will hold its first meeting in this city on Wednesday. James Gilchrist has been designated permanent secretary of the committee, and at the meeting on Wednesday a secretary and treasurer will be named and plans prepared for the organization of relief work to be carried out through the winter.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land and each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except in certain districts. Cattle may be obtained as soon as homesteaded, on certain conditions.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$10.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homesteaded, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$50.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$500.00.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.
