Good seed is scarce—Place your order now with your County Councillor.

The Department of Agriculture has ordered wheat and oats through the Seed Branch, Ottawa. The germination is carefully tested.

The seed is now stored in the elevators at Quebec, thus avoiding transportation difficulties and guaranteeing delivery.

The Department requested the co-operation of the County Councils in the distribution. Seed will be forwarded at their order in car lots, thus avoiding local freights and such handling.

Wheat will cost about \$3.00 per bushel in bags laid down.

The Seed Branch is yet unable to fix the price on oats. Definite prices will be stated in this space immediately they are at hand.

New Brunswick is expected to breed herself for the duration of the war. Every farmer should grow some wheat.

Agricultural Societies should arrange orders early.

Send all orders to the County Councillors immediately.

FIFTY-FOURTH ANNIVERSARY CHURCH SERVICE

Knights of Pythias Attended
Divine Worship in German
Street Baptist Church Yesterday—Able Sermon by
Rev. S. S. Poole.

The fifty-fourth anniversary church service of the Knights of Pythias in St. John was held yesterday afternoon in the German Street Baptist Church. The preacher of the occasion was the pastor of the church, Rev. S. S. Poole, and he was assisted in the service by Knight, Rev. David Hutchinson, D. D. The Knights to the number of about two hundred occupied seats reserved for them in the centre of the church, and a large number of friends were also present. No parade was held but the Knights met in the Institute and marched into the church in a body and took the seats reserved for them. The choir of the church rendered special music. The offering, which was a generous one, will go to the Protestant Orphans Home.

In his prayer Rev. Mr. Hutchinson made special reference to the brothers overseas fighting for king and country. The three city lodges, Union, New Brunswick and St. John, have at the present time sixty-six members on the honor roll, fourteen of whom are overseas have returned and three have paid the supreme sacrifice and lie "in Flanders Fields."

Rev. Mr. Poole based his remarks on the words found in 1 Samuel 23: 16, "And Jonathan, Saul's son, arose and went to David into the wood, and went to David into the wood, and strengthened his hand in God." He thanked the members of the order for the honor paid him in being asked to preach the anniversary sermon, and said as he had found on looking over the manual containing the principles of the order that one of the fundamentals was friendship, he proposed to say a few words on that subject founded on the friendship of David and Jonathan, which was the finest example of true friendship to be found in all history.

To possess a true friend was one of God's greatest blessings. Every joy was intensified and every sorrow was lightened if one had a friend to share them. Man was so constituted that he must have companionship in order to be happy. One of the characteristics of true friendship was faithfulness in the hour of adversity. Jonathan went to David in the wood when his father, Saul, was seeking David's life, and comforted him. It was remarkable how friendship stood the test of time and changed circumstances, but the true friend would be faithful under all conditions. In this respect the Knights of Pythias are up to their motto and never forsake a brother in adversity, but rather cling closer in the hour of need. It had been charged upon the fraternal orders that they condoned wrongs in their members, but this was not so. They required proof before condemning a brother, and this was right, and it surely was not wrong if a brother found to have sinned to throw over his fall the mantle of silence.

Another of the characteristics of friendship was mutual helpfulness. Here again the practice of the order squared with profession. They acted the part of true friends to all their brothers and each were willing to help every other brother to the limit of his ability.

He congratulated the order on the completion of another year of successful work and voiced the hope that the coming year might be equally successful.

DECLINES TO BECOME RECTOR OF SHEDIAC

Rev. Craig W. Nichols of Westfield Will Remain at Urgent Solicitation of His Parishioners.

Rev. Craig W. Nichols, rector of Westfield, has declined to accept an invitation to become rector of Shediac. When his parishioners at Westfield heard that he was likely to leave they signed a petition earnestly requesting him not to leave them. The petition was accompanied by an offer to increase his stipend by \$300 a year to \$1,200, the amount he could have received at Shediac. Westfield is now a self-sustaining parish, although not wealthy.

THE HEROISM OF SOLDIERS TOLD BY REV. W. R. ROBINSON

There was a large audience at the morning service in Ludlow street Baptist church yesterday. The full choir was present. The pastor, Rev. W. R. Robinson was assisted in the service by Rev. Dr. Heine and Rev. Gideon Smith.

The pastor in his sermon spoke of baptism, not as essential to salvation but as essential to service. He treated of the command, the mode and the element used, dealing especially with the baptism of the Lord in which he declared to John at the Jordan that it was necessary to fulfill all righteousness.

At the close of the service the ordinance of baptism was administered to the new candidates.

At the evening service the pastor spoke on the subject, "The Lord Our Righteousness." "In this world of affairs," he said, "the object of our labor seems to be the seeking of safety for our children, ourselves and our neighbors. To this the thought, care and toll of many are devoted. That while we have many false securities, appealing to the intellectual, the physical and the social, none so appeals to human life and the needs of the soul as the security of Jesus accorded to the inner life and the spiritual needs of men."

As a case in point he read a printed article entitled "Heroism of Soldiers of Canada," which he stated he had received enclosed in a letter from the city editor of one of our leading daily papers, a friend of his. Commending the article from this the material of which the boys of Canada, the heroes of our Empire, are made, Gunner Pte. Banks was wounded unto death. He was but a little distance from his comrades on the shell swept ground. It was right here that Corp. Albert Edward Johnson ran out and braved death that surged in on him from every side; not to save the physical life of his comrade for the shell swept ground, but to save the character, saving and both knew it, but prompted by a love more than human, more than physical, more than social, but Christ-like in its action and motive to stay by his dying comrade to the end, to afford him the comfort of his friendly presence. It was during this time that an officer with the very best of intentions rushed out while the shells screamed overhead and burst all around, with a bottle of liquor, thinking that it would act as a stimulant to help his dying comrade. But the brave lad whose life was fast ebbing out, looked up into his face with a wan smile and said, "Thank you; I have never taken a drink in my life," so they waited together by the dying man until the friend who first rushed out was killed too. As the stretcher-bearers took away the dead bodies of Pte. Banks and Corp. Johnson, the heroic officer, badly wounded, raised himself in his dying condition and saluted the two dead figures. 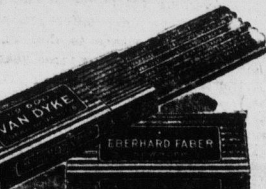

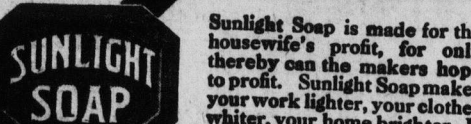
