BIG TEUTON DRIVE IN ITALY COMING

Rome, Mar. 25—Germany has sent fresh contingents of machine guns to the Italian front together with several aerial squadrons. According to reports from Innsbruck, General Boro-vic and General Conrad Von Hotzen-dorf have just returned to the headquarters of the supreme command after an inspection of the Trentino positions. Deputy Bevilone recently returned from the front and makes the following statement: "Everything makes me believe that as soon as natural conditions allow, a formidable enemy offensive will be launched at the Italian front. Austrian divisions continue to arrive without interruptions, taking up positions according to a plan whose purpose it is now possible for a few days to surmise. The enemy receives daily reinforcements while new aviation camps and munitions depots are observed to be under construction."

WANT BOUT HELD IN BALTIMORE

Baltimore, Md., Mar. 27.—Jesse Willard and Colonel J. C. Miller, his manager, conferred with police authorities today regarding the possibility of holding the champion's proposed title bout with Fred Fulton on July 4 next in Baltimore. The president of the police board, General Lawson Riggs, read the law governing boxing matches here to his visitors and told them that it was his opinion that the attitude of the general public would oppose such a fight as contemplated. The law requires that permits be secured from the mayor and the police board and the refusal of either would prevent the match. The law also stipulates fifteen rounds as the length of a boxing match.

New York, Mar. 27.—Martin J. Sheridan, world famous athlete, died of pneumonia at a hospital here tonight. Sheridan was born in Ireland in 1880.


