

SINN FEINERS REACH PEACE AGREEMENT

Free State and Republican Leader in Accord and Miracle Has Been Worked.

THREE MONTHS BEFORE IRISH ELECTION

Will Settle Terms of Constitution in Which Treaty Will Be Embodied.

Dublin, Feb. 22.—With dramatic suddenness a peace agreement, reached at the eleventh hour between Free State and Sinn Féin leaders, was sprung on the Anti Féin, or National Sinn Féin convention, today, and the huge gathering of delegates, impatient that any delay might endanger the treaty with Great Britain, gave its unanimous approval and adjourned for three months. The general feeling was that in preserving intact the party organization, something like a miracle had been worked.

The net result of the two days' signing of the Anti Féin is to insure that no election can be held in Ireland for the next three months and, when it is held, the issue will not simply be for or against the treaty, but to determine the judgment of the Irish people on the actual terms of a constitution in which the treaty will be embodied.

Supporters of the Free State have contended throughout that the treaty envisaged Ireland to frame for itself a constitution, giving all the essentials of freedom, but the Republicans have denied this and have quoted interpretations placed upon the treaty in speeches by Prime Minister Lloyd George and other British Cabinet Ministers.

TORONTO OFFICIALS RESENT STATEMENT

Piqued at Unfavorable Comparison of Financial Positions of Montreal and Toronto.

Toronto, Feb. 22.—Mayor Maguire and Finance Commissioner Rose, of this city warmly resent an unfavorable comparison of the relative financial positions of Montreal and Toronto made in a local morning paper. The comparison was in connection with a statement that \$6,000,000 City Money bond had been purchased by Great Toronto Income and the paper said that in some respects Montreal's finances were more favorable than Toronto's, even though in Toronto a larger proportion of the gross debt was revenue-producing than was the case in Montreal.

WILL HUNT SEALS WITH AIRPLANE
