As early as seven o'clock the electors began to gather in groups at city hall, and all through the evening until the last poll was announced and a large crowd wait-ed in the building or on the street in front

ed in the building or on the street in front of it. It was a good natured crowd, that smoked and talked and chaffed. Common Clerk Wardroper and his clerk, Mr. Brittain, were there to receive the returns. David Willet, who has followed the aldermanic races for twenty years, was there with an up-to-date score card, and tallied the lists as they came in, giving the totals to the eager crowd inside; so that they knew when each ward was heard from exactly how all the candidates stood, up to that time. Within two minutes after Prince ward was heard from, he an-nounced the total vote for each candidate, in the whole city. Ald. Hamm, Bullock and Tilley, who were not in the contest, were early on the scene. Ald. Lewis, Hilyard and Macrae also came in. A little before 9 o'clock changes. In one ward it was reported that the Hebrew residents had combined against one of the aldermen. Just then the rabbi and others came along to vote and a Telegraph man asked them if the report were true. They said no, every man vas voting as he desired. The labor leaders last night expresse homselves well satisfied with the outcom

scene. Ald. Dewis, rhight and hadne also came in. A little before 9 o'clock Mayor White, who then was seen to be on the winning side, appeared, wearing a happy expression, and Dr. Frink also came in.
