LONDON, May 23.

Consols 94 1/2; 95; breadstuffs quiet.

The Federal Laborers' Union of England accepted mediation of Dixon and Morley for a settlement of the agricultural lockout in the eastern counties.

A London News special despatch from Paris reports that all hopes of passing constitutional laws have been abandoned.

The appointment of Gen. Cassy to the Premiership causes a sensation.

Despatches from Santander represent that the Carlist raid in that vicinity was a formidable movement. Some 1,500 insurgents are within five leagues of the town; they give no quarter.

Paris generally thinks that the ministry is more of a business character than the representative of any political faction.

A detachment of the Republican troops, surrounded near Santander to Carlists, have been liberated by troops sent to their relief.

New York, May 23.

Vessels arriving here the past week and to-day all report passing large icebergs in the region of latitude 44°.

Late advices from the British Islands state that a heavy gale there on the 18th inst., destroyed all the salt ponds, rendering them unproductive for the next three months.

The United States Senate, after an all night session, passed the Civil Rights bill with some amendments, by a vote of 23 to 16.

The President and family, and many prominent Federal officers and friends, embarked on the revenue cutters and accompanied Mr. and Mrs. Santor down the bay. The vessels were decorated with flags and streamers. Salutes were fired from forts and batteries.

LONDON, May 23.

FRENCH AFFAIRS.

Prince Clovis Hohenzollern, the new German Ambassador to France, presented his Credentials to President MacMahon Saturday.

The French Assembly adjourned until Thursday, to enable the Ministry to arrange the order of business.

The majority of the French Assembly appears resolved to support the new Ministry.

The London Times' Paris correspondent thinks that the new Ministry will fall if it attempts to go beyond mere administration, and states that MacMahon yesterday threatened to resign.

PARLIAMENT OF CANADA.

(Special to the News.)

OTTAWA, May 22.

The House met at 1 o'clock to-day, and most of the business remaining on the agenda was transacted.

The Involuntary Law was postponed, and the present one, with some amendments made by the Senate, remains in force. Two of the Hon. Mr. Smith's measures—the extending provisions of "Seamen's Act" to inland waters of Canada, the other providing for improvement of harbors by tonnage dues, were also dropped.

Among measures which passed after some opposition, was the one authorizing the transfer of the Windsor Branch of the Nova Scotia Railway to Western Counties Railway Company.

At 5 o'clock the House adjourned till 9:30 o'clock to-night to await the bills from the Senate.

The investigation into Section 16 matters resulted in every charge against contractors of the late Government falling through. Every engineer, from Sandford Fleming down, except Fitzgerald, agreed in stating that the same principles which controlled the work on every section of the Intercolonial were applied to Section 16. The evidence is totally damaging to Fitzgerald, from first to last, he was scheming to get a contract from Gough's hands, and would only give the contractors justice by receiving bribes. The Government have appropriated Gough's plan on the line, worth \$7,000, refusing to pay anything for it.
