Here and There

More than one hundred and fifty traders from the Far North arrived in Edmonton, Alta., recently bringing with them fur sales to the value of approximately \$500,000.

Tarzan Second, the largest wooden scow in the world, was launched recently at the Wallace shipyards, Vancouver, B.C. She is 1,000 tons burden and has 300,000 feet of British Columbia lumber in her make-up. The scow is to be used as a carrier for a great pile-driver for Sydney E. Junkins Company.

Two dinosaurs have been located in the Red Deer Valley, Alta., near the Canadian Pacific Railway line this summer, by the University of Toronto expedition, composed of four scientists who prospectored for several weeks in the gorge and are packing up the prehistoric monsters for shipment to the Royal Ontario Museum. Another skeleton has been located by the Geological Survey of Canada.

One of the outstanding features of Canadian trade with the Orient during the past year or so has been the remarkable increase in wheat flour exports. Imports of Canadian wheat flour into Hong Kong in 1923 were the largest on record, showing an increase of 109 per cent in volume over those of 1922. The figures and values were: 1922, 79,585 barrels, valued at \$126,060; 1923, 191,821 barrels, valued at \$249,014.

Zane Grey, the famous novelist, recently caught a 758 pound tuna fish, constituting what is believed to be a world's record. The sea monster was successfully conquered after three hours and ten minutes of grilling endeavor off the Nova Scotia coast, and towed into Liverpool harbor. Mr. Grey's prize is a species of the blue fin family. The record before this catch was held by J. K. L. Ross, the well-known Montreal sportsman and financier, who caught a 710 pound tuna.

One of the most remarkable achievements in art printing yet produced in Canada and one which finally disposes of the idea that such work cannot be satisfactorily handled by Canadian firms is found in the new booklet issued by the Canadian Pacific Railway dealing with the forthcoming 1925 Round the World cruise of the company's steamship "Empress of France." The booklet contains 40 pages of text and color illustrations, the latter exquisitely combining many brilliant hues in a number of highly imaginative designs.

EKFRID COUNCIL

The council of the township of Ekfrid met in the town hall, Appin, on Thursday, September 18. All the members were present. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved, and signed by the Reeve.

A by-law was passed imposing a percentage of two per cent on all taxes of 1924 unpaid on the 15th day of December, 1924, and an additional three per cent, on all taxes of 1924 unpaid on the 1st of January, 1925.

The Reeve and clerk were appointed to adjust all outstanding accounts between Ekfrid and Metcalfe.

A grant of \$50 each was made to the Mosa & Ekfrid Agricultural Society and the Melbourne Agricultural Society.

The council adjourned to meet in the town hall, Appin, on Thursday, October 16th.

BY-LAW No. 791

A By-law for Stopping Up the Highway on Lot 17 in the 3rd Range South of the Longwoods Road in the Township of Ekfrid.

WHEREAS an application was made by the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Township of Ekfrid to the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board for an order relieving the said corporation from the obligation to rebuild the bridge over the creek on the River Road through lot number seventeen in the third range south of the Longwoods Road in the Township of Ekfrid in the County of Middlesex;

AND WHEREAS on the 18th day of September, 1923, the said Ontario Railway and Municipal Board made an order granting the said application upon payment by the said corporation to Thomas Brown, the owner of the said lot number seventeen, of the sum of one hundred dollars and the conveyance to him by the township of the road in question;

AND WHEREAS it is desirable to stop up the said highway and to convey it to the said Thomas Brown in pursuance of the said order;

THEREFORE the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Township of Ekfrid enacts as follows:

1. That that portion of the road through lot number seventeen in the third range south of the Longwoods Road in the said Township of Ekfrid, which may be more particularly known and described as follows, that is to say: All and singular that certain parcel or tract of land and premises situate, lying and being in the Township of Ekfrid in the County of Middlesex and being composed of part of lot 17 in range 3 south of the Longwoods Road, which said parcel or tract of land is used as a road allowance and may be more particularly described as follows: i.e., a strip of land one rod in perpendicular width on each side of the below described centre line and shown colored red on the attached plan; commencing at a point in the north-easterly limit of said lot 17 and 29.5 feet south-easterly from the north-easterly angle of said lot; thence south 47 degrees and 53 minutes west 295 feet and 6 inches; thence south 56 degrees and 35 minutes west 270 feet and 6 inches; thence south 40 degrees and 18 minutes west 303 feet and 3 inches; thence south 37 degrees and 54 minutes west 395 feet and 2 inches; thence south 35 degrees and 03 minutes west 345 feet; thence south 33 degrees and 57 minutes east 190 feet; thence south 33 degrees and 03 minutes west 90 feet; thence north 67 degrees and 33 minutes west 180 feet, be and the same is hereby stopped up.

2. That the said hereinbefore described portion of the said road be conveyed to the said Thomas Brown.

3. That the Treasurer of the said Corporation of the Township of Ekfrid be and he is hereby authorized to pay to the said Thomas Brown the sum of one hundred dollars in pursuance of the order of the said Ontario Railway and Municipal Board.

4. That the Reeve and Clerk be and they are hereby authorized to execute on behalf of the Township of Ekfrid the annexed deed of the said road and to deliver the same to the said Thomas Brown upon execution thereof by him.

5. That barricades be placed at both ends of the portion of the said road hereby closed as aforesaid, in order to enforce the due observance of this by-law.

6. That this by-law is to take effect from and after the passing of a by-law of the Council of the County of Middlesex confirming this by-law.

READ a first, second and third time and finally passed this 22nd day of May, 1924.
