WITCH BUS OF CANADIAN PACIFIC ATLANTIC FLEET.

Official Announcement-Price Paid For Steamers Not Made Public-Deal May Affect Fast Line Con-

Montreal, Feb. 24.—The Canadian Pacific Railway has completed the negotiations with the Elder-Dempster Company for the acquisition of an Atlantic fleet, and Sir Thomas Shaughnessy was able to announce the purchase of fourteeen vessels. The service itself. Sir Thomas said, would be both passenger and freight, and the transaction has been completed entirely without regard to the question of a Government subsidy. Among the other details which have yet to be arranged is that of remuneration by the Gov-ernment for the carrying of the mails, which comes within the scope of the operations of the passenger steamers.

when comes within the scope of the operations of the passenger steamers. When asked about the price paid for the fleet, Sir Thomas said he would rather that information came from Sir Alfred Jones, the Chairman of the Elder-Dempster Company. Despatches from London stated that the price has not been disclosed there years but it is understood to be about \$7,500,000. It is reported in Montreal that the price per ton was about one-third less than was paid by Mr. Morgan for the steamships in his combine.

The deal was put through in London by Mr. Arthur Piers, General Superintendent of the steamship department of the company; who has been on the other side for two months, and who is also arranging for the building

who is also arranging for the building of three passenger boats of 10,000 tons each. These will, it is said, be built

The first result undonbtedly will be the retirement of the Elder-Dempster Line from the regular Canadian trade, and the partial, though perhaps only temporary, withdrawal of other vessels."

On the other hand, Mr. H. Mon-other Mr. H. Mon-tagu Allan of the Allan Line, when stold of the announcement, and of the comment thereon by the London pa-per, said:—"I fail to see how the fast line contract is affected. So far as we are concerned, it does not change our position in the least.

"The price is a very good one, but I suppose the Canadian Pacific knew what it was about."

Lord Dunraven Expresses Hope of its

London, Feb. 24.—The Earl of Duni raven was interviewed regarding the report of the Irish Landlord and Tenants' Conference in Dublin, of which he was Chairman. He spoke hopefully regarding the prospects of legislation, which, he thought, would end the difficulties in Ireland. Lord Dunraven said :-- "The utterances of King Edward and of British public men, the temper of Ireland, the receppublic, and the action of the Government since its publication are all favorable indications pointing to the suc cess of the Government's Irish land bill, which, if it contains a just bill, which, if it contains a just and generous offer, will make good the first impression on which all depends. The bill, if drawn on the lines of the report, will insure a final settlement and remove the cause of friction in Ireland, which is reacting unfavorably not only in Great Britain but throughout the empire and on our kindred in the United States."

Lord Dunraven replied to the adverse criticism of the report, saying that the conferees could not lay down a specific formula to be adopted. They were obliged to deal with the matter on the broadest lines, considering both the interests of the nation and those of individual landlord and tenants. He did not think that the Governmen would be able to of individual landlord and tenants. He did not think that the Governmen would be able to specify a strict formula, which, if attempted, would confuse the issue. The minor details of any plan based on voluntarism must be left to the purchasers and sellers. The conference only sought to formulate the conditions under which it would be possible to complete the transfer of the conditions under which it would be possible to complete the transfer of the land within a reasonable period. His Lordship concluded by saying that he did not think that the demand on the State treasury would be disproportionate to the benefits gained.

INSURGENTS DEFEATED.

Higuerote, Venezuela, Feb. 23. Gen. Olivares, at the head of the Government troops from Barcelona, yesterday attacked at Tacarigua the rear guard of the revolutionist force conmanded by Gen. Caribe Vidal. After a fight lasting ten hours the rebel force abandoned the field, leaving a number of wounded, among them Vidal and another rebel leader named Flores.
